BETRAYED HIS TRUST.
Clerk in the Education Department Suspended
FOR DIVULGING OFFICE SECRETS.
Supplied the P.P.A. With Important Documents.

Eden Williams, for 12 Years a Trusted Clerk of the Minister of Education, Charged With Supplying Photographs and Copies of Important Documents to the P.P.A. Organization for Use in the Campaign of June Last—The Accused Admits His Guilt to Hon. Mr. Ross and Surrenders the Forfeited Papers.

Eden Williams, for twelve years a clerk in the Education Department, has been suspended pending the investigation of a serious charge. It is that of divulging private letters and documents for the purpose of making copies or photographs of them for political purposes.

Handed Over to the P.P.A.
The Minister of Education asserts that he not only has Williams' admission that he took private papers for his own use, but claims that certain members of the P.P.A. organization induced Williams to get possession of his letters, and that he justified in this suspicion in a few days' time.

Mr. Ross Interviewed.
Hon. G. W. Ross, Minister of Education, said today: "I do not wish to say very much about the matter. Williams was guilty of most flagrant conduct, and he has been suspended on that account. I am extremely sorry for him; he seems to regret his conduct very much. He was appointed by me as one of my 'good boys.' You will understand that it is a grave offence for a clerk in my office to divulge or make copies of important private papers. The investigation is being held at the present time, and I am hoping to discover the full extent of this offence. Although I have reason to believe that he is not a political agent, I am sure that the full papers he had in his possession."

The Forfeited Papers.
As to the exact nature of the papers in question, the honorable gentleman was reticent. They are supposed to relate to the conduct of the various schools and similar matters involving the separate school question, which has already been mentioned in this column. Mr. Ross, and would necessarily be of interest to the P.P.A.

How the Copying Was Done.
It is not thought that Williams has betrayed his employers of late in any way. Most of the purloining charged against him took place last year. His method is supposed to have been that of removing letters and other papers and making photostatic and written copies of them over night. Most of them he brought back next day, but a number he kept back and these he handed to Hon. G. W. Ross yesterday.

The Accused Clerk.
Williams is about 29 years of age and a married man. His salary was \$800 per year. He has three children and resides at 1410 Dundas-street. Formerly he lived at 23 Grosvenor-street. He was up to a point a well-to-do agent, but he was later induced to give up his position as a salesman for the P.P.A. organization. He is a native of Ontario.

HOT SHOT FOR R. J. FLEMING.
MEN WHO KNOW THE MAN EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS ON HIM.
Fleming Brought About the Ashbridge's Bay Suits, Paid \$55,000 to the Canadian Pacific Railway, and the Adoption of the Trolley System and Landed the City in a Sea of Trouble About the Permanent Pavements.

Mayor Kennedy's second grand rally at the Auditorium last night was a magnificent gathering. From the opening of the house was packed with an audience enthusiastically in favor of Mr. Kennedy's candidature. W. R. Brock occupied the chair, and on the platform were Alexander Manning, James Brandon, Rev. Dr. Potts, R. W. Pittie, R. W. Elliot, S. B. Heakes, J. N. Kennedy, Charles Spenser, Follis Johnson, J. H. McNeil, ex-Mayor James Beatty, J. C. Robinson, Peter McIntyre, J. A. Livingston, John Armstrong, O. A. Howland, M.L.A., C. W. Biggar, ex-Mayor Clarke, W. W. John and Dr. Barrie.

One of the amusing features of the evening was the way in which the various speakers mixed the names of ex-Mayor Fleming and Mayor Kennedy. Roars of laughter followed each break of this kind. It was the chairman introduced Mr. Kennedy as "Mayor Fleming" the hilarity of the audience knew no bounds.

Why Mr. Brock supports Mayor Kennedy W. R. Brock, in opening the proceedings, said he was heartily in accord with Mr. Kennedy, not only as Mayor of the city, but with the record that he had made during the past year. (Applause.) He supported the candidate because he thought he was the better candidate of the two. Last year's mayor and the Mayor's work in it had satisfied him that he had been the right man in the right place. (Applause.)

There was also the reduction in taxation from 17 1/4 mills to 16 1/2 mills, mainly due to Mayor Kennedy, he had kept down expenses through economy, he had reduced the dollar value of the debt, and he had fought against the aqueductors who had tried to get through an agreement that would have been to themselves and inimical to the city.

Mr. Howland's Masterly Address.
The next speaker was Mr. Howland, who, on rising, was loudly applauded. Mr. Kennedy, he said, had done a great deal for the city, but he had done one thing originally for the workers of the city, and that was to bring down the cost of living. (Applause.)

WANT AN INVESTIGATION.
NEWFOUNDLANDERS WILL ASK FOR A ROYAL COMMISSION.
The Imperial Government may interfere. It is rumored, without the formality of being petitioned—in a letter the Inspector of Schools describes the Disturbance Prevailing Throughout the Island.

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 4.—Resolutions favoring the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the colony's affairs were presented in the Legislature last night. The Government opposed them, and refused to take action on the matter. The promoters of the movement will appeal to the Governor and to the British Government direct.

London, Jan. 4.—The Dover mail boat Empress of France, at Calais, France, Many London persons are on board. It is estimated that 200 fishermen belonging to the vicinity were drowned during the recent gale.
