antee that the Fund will be properly managed. The object of the organization is to collect, administer and distribute a fund for the assistance of the wives and children of officers and men, residents of Canada, who during the war may be on active service with the mili-

tary forces of the British Empire. The collectors will call on you at an early date, and it is to be hoped that Watford will not be behind other towns of its size in subscribing an amount in keeping with the lively military spirit that has so far been manifested in our midst.

We are aware that the citizens have already been asked several times for subscriptions for patriotic purposes and they have responded generously, but this Fund should be paramount and the amount raised large enough to show that we fully appreciate our responsibility in the mat-
