Toronto, May 18.—Receipts at the Union stockyards to-day were 555 cattle, 136 calves, 1,132 hogs and 101 sheep and lambs.

With light receipts to-day the market

settled down again, steadying at about yesterday's general decline. Heavy beef cattle were the hardest hit and the slowest to feel any reviving lead. Choice loads in this class sold to-day fully as low as yesterday. Choice fat cows and bulls were steady. Stocker trade was very quiet, both for domestic and outside orders.

Calves steady. Sheep and lambs steady at this week's decline.

Hogs were strong, advancing 10c to 15c over yesterday's quotations.

There were probably 1,500 cattle left over from yesterday's bid receipts.

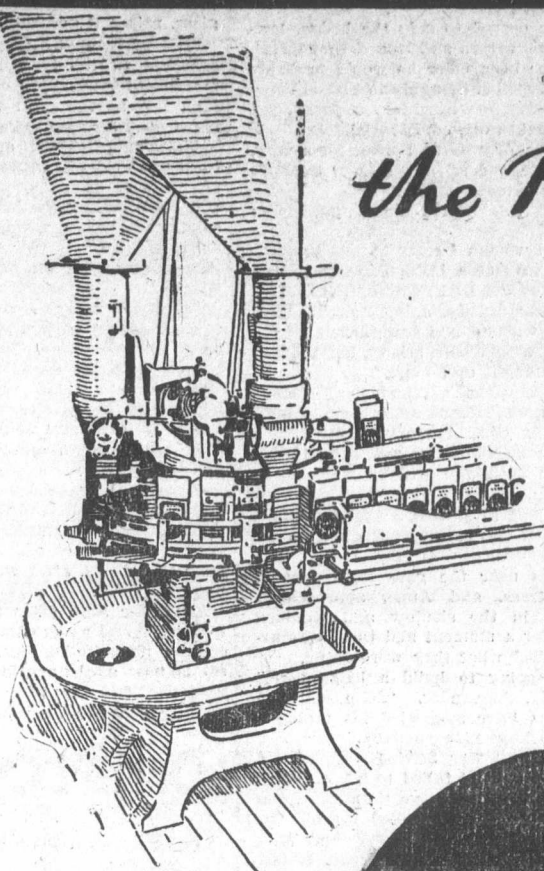
To Mrs. Chas. Joynt and family—

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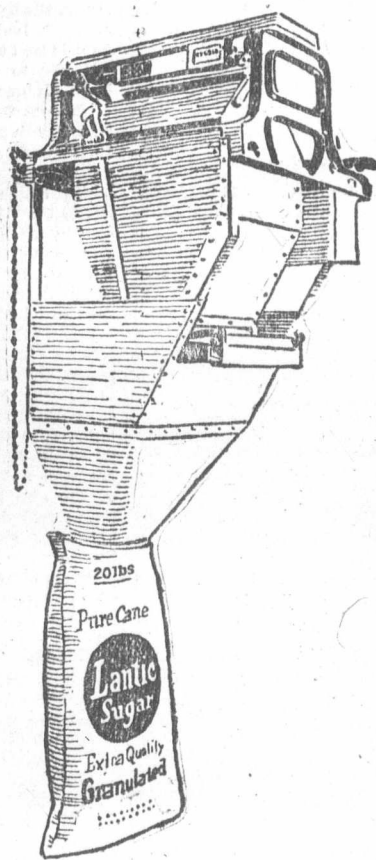
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
