**Rearing Young Turkeys**

The rearing of young turkeys is not as difficult as is generally supposed. It is true that they will not stand exposure to cold or damp weather, but when given a reasonable chance they can be successfully reared in any province in Canada. When the poults are ready to be taken from the nest, they and the mother turkey should be taken to a suitable place in the open. A convenient coop should be provided and be in waiting for the brood. An ordinary sized turkey can brood from twenty to twenty-five poults with safety. If any turkey eggs have been set under hens the poults should be given to the mother turkey at hatching time as she can rear them more successfully than can the foster mother.

**Feeding the Poults:** Poults should not be fed until they are at least forty-eight hours old and even sixty hours is not too long to leave them without food. The first feed should be chick size oyster shell which should be scattered on a small board. Sour skim milk should also be given at this time. This is sufficient for them for most of the day and should be given in the morning. About four o'clock in the afternoon they should be given some hard-boiled eggs which have been chopped fine. The following morning start regular feeding on hard-boiled eggs and bread crumbs mixed together and fed three times daily until the birds are one week old. At this time the eggs should be gradually discontinued and the feed consist of bread alone. When the birds are about two weeks old a little moist shorts may be added to the ration and the bread crumbs discontinued until the feed consists of shorts alone. Any change should be made gradually and no evil effects will result. At this stage it will be found that the young poults are getting much of their feed on the range and require very little feeding, and the feeds should then be reduced to two, morning and evening.

Sour skim milk and pure water should be given daily from the start. Grit and oyster shell should also be provided. Care should be taken never to overfeed or to offer any food that has been mixed for a previous feeding. As the poults develop it will be found that the area over which they travel becomes greater and that the amount of feed consumed at home decrease, until very little feeding is necessary. It will also be found that the birds grow and thrive better on the wide range with very little feed. This is why turkeys must have free range to make economical gains.

**Shooting the Red:** When the poults are about six weeks old they should get their red heads after which time exposure to rain does them little harm and they may then be allowed to roost in the open, on trees or on roosts put up for the purpose. They should be allowed to roost high enough from the ground to protect them from beasts of prey. Before the poults get their red heads they should be protected from cold rain storms as they take cold very easily if they get wet over the back when young and when the feathers are undeveloped. Dew on the grass will not hurt them providing the weather is warm.

**Handling Natural Swarms**

(Experimental Farms Note). To facilitate the handling of natural swarms, clip the wings of all laying queens early in the season, preferably during the first honey flow. Clipping the queen's wings does not stop the colony from swarming but prevents the queen leaving with the swarm, which will return as soon as the bees realize that the queen is not with them. When the swarm issues, the queen will usually be found on the ground in front of the hive. Place her in a small box or cage and while the swarm is in the air move the old hive from its stand, replacing it with a new hive fitted with empty drawn comb or foundation. Over the new hive place a queen excluder and on top of this, all the supers from the old hive. The swarm will return to the new hive and as the bees enter the queen can be released among them at the entrance.

To prevent after-swarms, the combs in the old, or parent colony should be examined at once, all queen cells destroyed and a young laying queen introduced. If no queens are available, leave one capped and one uncapped cell. The parent colony is left standing by the side of the new hive, but with its entrance facing at right angles to that of the new. Turn the parent colony a little each day so that in about six days its entrance will be facing in the same direction as that of the new hive. On the ninth or tenth day, when the bees are flying freely, move the parent colony to a new location, this will cause all the workers to unite with the swarm.

If by accident a swarm issues with a flying queen, it will usually cluster on some nearby tree or bush. After the bees are all settled, the limb on which they cluster can be cut off and the swarm carried and shaken down in front of a hive prepared for it, or it can be returned to the hive from which it issued, first destroying all queen cells. The old colony requeened ten days later with a young laying queen.

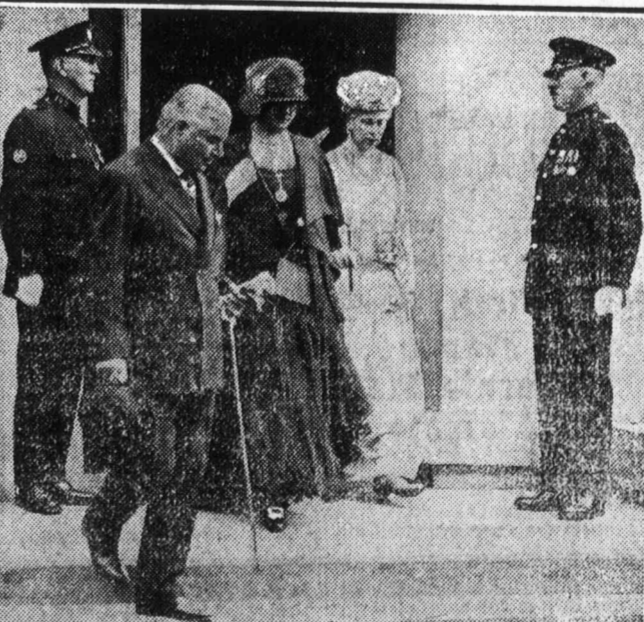
