It has no atmosphere. It cannot have inhabitants, unless organic life can subsist under conditions radically different from those on earth. The moon is an arid region, where there is no vegitation, where there is not how wooden fauces—"wood cocks—with care." He gladly paid the plains and exhausted craters.—A tleast, such is the case with the only side of the moon which is or ever can be canned by mortal cybe.
