Over there the people favel been clamoring for a change in their tariff ever since the year 1890. In the congressional and state elections of that year the McKinley tariff was made almost the sole issue, and the result was an overwhelming defeat for that measure. Again in 1892 the same thing was repeated with even greater emphasis. But it was not until the autumn of 1893 that the Wilson bill, which was to take the place of the McKinley tariff, was made public. This bill passed the House of Representatives in December last, and went up to the Senate where it still remains. Just when, if ever, it will get through that body, and what shape it will be in when it does finally pass, are questions which the future only can reveal. In the meantime the revenue has fallen off to so great an extent that instead of the immense surplus of a few years ago the present year's transactions show a huge deficit of about \$70,000\$, which has had to be met by borrowing. And the stagnation in business, caused by the present uncertainty, aided by other causes, has led to such a reaction that there is now a perfect stampede back to McKinleyism one more.
