MARINE NEWS

Schr. Scotia Queen arrived at Boston Jan. 10th, where she will be taken over by her new Halifax owners.

The new tern schooner Edith M. Green, sailed from Halifax Monday, for St. Pierre, on her maiden voyage.

Schr. Nellie is at Parrsboro, waiting a favorable opportunity to sail for Digby, with a load of soft coal for Mr. W. E. VanBlarcom.

Maritime Fish Corporation arrivals at Digby: 19,950 lbs. haddock, 942 lbs. hake, 1,342 lbs. cod; other sources, 22,262 lbs. cod, 10,850 lbs. haddock, 440 qts. dry cod.

Amongst the North Land's outward cargo from Yarmouth to Boston Wednesday morning were 750 cases fresh fish and 534 crates of lobsters. The latter sold in Boston at \$50.00 per crate.

Yarmouth Telegram: Messrs. d'En Bros. have just commenced in their shop at South End, the construction of a large motor fish boat for one of the local fish firms. When completed Louis Abrie will take charge of her.

The tug Freddie V., now owned by Denis LeBlanc, Wedgeport, which has been for some months past engaged in towing in connection with the dredging operations in Liverpool, N. S. harbor, has returned to Wedgeport to be laid up for the winter.

A free navigation school for seamen, in charge of Captain John Simmons, is now in operation at Halifax; also at Sydney, Yarmouth and St. John, in charge of Captain James Southland, B. R. Hilton and A. P. Oweit, respectively. These schools are under the auspices of the Department of the Marine and Fisheries.

Halifax Chronicle: Capt. L. Wentzell and crew have arrived from Mahone Bay to take over the tern schr. Edith M. Green, now at Parrsboro's wharf. They will take her to St. Pierre, where she has been sold, and will then return home. Captain Oliver Comeau and the crew which brought the Edith M. Green here from Digby county, have returned home.

The biggest check ever paid out by the Fish Exchange at the South Boston pier, for a groundfish trip of a sailing vessel, was handed to the skipper and owners of schr. Laverna last week. The craft in command of Capt. John MacInnis weighed off 138,235 pounds fish and received \$5,396.90 for her trip. The crew's part was \$199.90 clear to a man. The Laverna carries 23 men.

Many shipping men of St. John, were attracted to the South wharf Tuesday morning, where they surveyed a large new schooner, the Racewell, owned by A. H. Comeau & Co., of Meteghan, N. S., which was moored there. She was towed into port by the tug Stadium and while there will be given a general overhauling. The Racewell registers 337 tons, and will make her maiden voyage to South Africa in the near future.

The tern schooner Alfredock Hedley, of 461 tons register, was successfully launched at Parrsboro on Tuesday from the shipyard of G. M. Cochrane. Her dimensions are 152 1/2 feet long; width 36 feet; depth 12 1/2 feet. She is owned by Adam B. MacKay, of Hamilton, Ontario, and was to have been launched the last of December, but the severity of the weather prevented. She will load lumber at Port Greyville for New York. Mr. MacKay was also the owner of the four-masted schooner Letitia T. McKay, recently built by Dr. T. H. Macdonald, at Meteghan.

Halifax Recorder: The steel barge Benmore, which has been lying at anchor on the Dartmouth side of the harbor nearly a year, has been sold by the Department of Railways and Canals to Parrsboro & Company, who in turn sold her to New York parties. She was formerly a full-rigged ship built at Port Glasgow, G. B., in 1870, an 1,427 tons net. The Benmore was towed here from Sydney a year ago on the marine railway at Dartmouth for repairs. She will be towed to New York, and Delton's new steamer Rosina B. may take her there.

Friday's Yarmouth Telegram: The handsome new steamer Keith Cann was given a trial run yesterday afternoon and everything worked splendidly, surpassing the highest expectations of her owners and builders. The steamer was run out around the bell buoy off Cat Rock, and returned, averaging a speed of 11 1/2 knots, which at times was easily run up to a rate of about 12. A heavy sea was met outside the Cape, and the ship, though light, worked beautifully.
