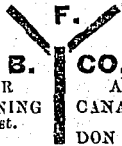

Commercial Summary.

The addition to the Valleyfield Cotton Fac-
tory is almost finished and nearly ready for the
new machinery. The stock of the company is
quoted at 60 above par.

COATICOOKE, Que., has just been supplied
with water works.—The work on the factory
building of the Magog Print and Textile Com-
pany has been suspended for the winter.

A St. John, N.B., despatch says: J. E. Mont-
gomery, the only merchant tailor in Albert
Village, Albert County, has "skipped out,"
leaving liabilities of \$3,370 and assets of \$1,200.
Even the working girls have been left unpaid.

CONRAD SCHURR, butcher of Walkerton,
Ont., has assigned for the benefit of his credi-
tors to John Klein of the same place. His
liabilities are put at \$350; assets about \$300.
Schurr formerly compromised at 50c. in the
dollar, but has not been able to meet all the
installments. Trouble: Small capital; bad
debts; too much credit.—Robert Millons has
opened a second-hand store and auction room
in Walkerton.

The name of Mr. A. McBean, of Port Hope,
referred to in a previous issue as contradicting
the report that he was endeavoring to compro-
mise with his creditors, was erroneously given
as William instead of Archibald McBean.

Mr. NEIL DARRACH, contractor for the new
Grand Central hotel at St. Thomas, Ont., has
made an assignment. It is understood, how-
ever, that there will be no delay in finishing the
hotel, which was to have been opened this
week.

JOHN IRVING, grocer and liquor dealer at
Kingston, N.B., claims to have lost some \$2,000
by the recent failure of R. Campbell, of Pictou,
N.S., and offers to compromise with his credi-
tors at 50c. on the dollar, secured, and payable
six months from date.

The number of miles of Canadian railways
open for traffic up to December, 1879, was
6,256 miles; to December, 1880, 6,991, and to
December, 1881, 7,230 miles. The mileage under
traffic up to the end of December, 1882, will
show a very large increase, and exhibits the
largest increase of railway systems in all the
British colonial possessions except British India.
