SAMUEL M. BURNSIDE, Esq.-We regret-that the list of deaths in our present paper must include that of Samuel M. Burnside. He died at his residence in this city, last Friday, at the age of 67, after an illness which confined him but a few weeks.

Mr. Burnside was a gentleman widely known, esteemed, and respected in the State. He was for many years a successful practising lawyer, and has left but few behind him who were his contempories in the morning of his professional life. He at one period represented Worcester in the Legislature; but he was more generally known in his professional calling, by his active interest in the cause of education, and by his many good qualities in social life. He was, indeed, one of the links (not too many of which remain) that conpected Worcester of the past with Worcester of the present. As a scholar and a student of our local history, his attainments were well known to oducate men. For a long time he was a member of the American Antiquarian Society. We can bear witness to his knowledge of the men and history of the country in times gone by, and to the accuracy with which he treasured, and the interest with which he narrated them. As a minute and careful observer of passing events, as a good reasoner, as a sound and judicious man, he has left a reputation enhanced by his known integrity and approved ability. The death of such a man is a public loss, and we could not in sincerity place it among the tidings of the week without a passing tribute to his virtues and his worth.- Nutional Ægi-, Worcester, Mass.

St. Ann's Church, Montreal, Canada.

TINIIS appeal is made to the Christian public, in behalf of the fund to be applied towards the restoration of St. Ann's Church Montreal.

THE CHURCH OF ST. ANN'S Was erected by voluntary contributions, and at considerable expense, in the centre of a densely populated district of the City, -a district chiefly inhabited by people of the poorest and most destitute class. It was designed to be, and it was the Church of the poor, in which the sittings were almost entirely free, and from which the officiating Clergyman received no stipend whatever.

The building was capable of affording accommodation to at least eight hundred persons. It was a substantial stone structure, the foundation stone of which was laid by the lamented Lord Metcalfe, when Governor General of Canada. It had only been used as a place of public worship for a period of five years, when it was burned to the ground with one hundred and ninety three dwelling houses in its immediate vicinity, on Saturday the 15th of June, 1850.

The fire which burned the Church was the most destructive that ever visited the City of Montreal, not only from the amount of property consumed but from the severe suffering which was brought upon the poor and necessitous-at least one thousand persons became bouseless and very many were rendered destitute by the terrible calamity.

The relief of the temporal necessities of the houseless poor, required the immediate-exertion of the people of Montreal; and charity was largely dispersed in contri-butions of food, clothing, shelter, and money. Nor indeed were the offerings of the more affluent confined to the mitigation of temporal sufferings, - on the contrary, they speedily contributed an amount of £400 towards the fund for rebuilding the ruined church, a building in which but few of the subscribers were interested, otherwise than as members of that Church whose care it has ever been to preach the Gospel to the poor.

The section of the city in which the Church was situated, is generally resorted to by the Immigrant upon his first arrival from the Mother Country, and those who projected its erection were animated by the laudable hope that the friendless stranger would find upon his coming to Canada a spiritual home, where he might worship in the prayers and praises of his Fatherland-and in which he might find a judicious adviser in the stated Minister of the Church.

By the tire which has destroyed this House of Prayer, the passing Immigrant as well as the resident poor have been temporarily deprived of the blessing which it was intended they should possess, and it remains now with the Christian public to determine whether this temporary deprivation shall become a permanent loss; whether the means of grace shall be withdrawn from the wayfaring man and the stranger, and the voice of prayer silenced in that destitute neighbourhood,

The Committee appeal to all, and especially to those who confess their belief in the Communion of Saints, to aid them in their endeavours to restore this ruined structure and thus-to continue to the poor of Christ's church the privilege and the blessing of Christ's ordinances.
