

The conference entitled "Burma: The South Africa of the 90's" was held on Saturday, Nov 19th at Carleton University. It was organized by the John Wilson Fund. Over 40 people attended, including 1000 students from Carleton University and 1000 school groups from across Canada, the Northwest and British Columbia. The focus of the day was to establish strategies for implementing selective purchasing campaigns on educational institutions, compare student-led consumer awareness campaigns, other countries and have the participants use basic analytic tools to help them to launch their own campaigns.

A portion of the conference was allotted to discuss Canada's policy towards Burma and to make recommendations. Some of the participants have worked on the Thai-Burma border, travelled within Burma and followed Burma issues extensively. The following items reflect what the recommendations were about:

1) Canada has to become more outspoken in Burma and put pressure to our needs of condemnation. Through the reference to Burma appearing more prominently in public speeches by the Minister, Canada has a responsibility to include the name of the elected democratic party within Burma.
