whole city of Hull. It partly destroyed the interprovincial bridge. There are oil tanks on adjacent property. If the fire had spread to them they might have exploded, and the wind could easily have carried the flames to the houses of parliament and other government buildings on this side of the Ottawa river.

The significance of Friday night's conflagration should not be allowed to pass unnoticed. Some years ago a fire on the opposite side of the river destroyed much of the city of Hull and seriously menaced this city of Ottawa. If plans for a capital worthy of Canada are to go forward successfully, there must be both a restraint on the use of property by firms and individuals, and a directed effort by the government to hold desirable properties for their best use in accordance with a general plan for the capital and district.
