Dear Currie,

You may be rather surprised to see a letter from me ! I am on a visit to Canada in connection with some business for the formation of a Canadian branch of an English Company, in which I am interested, for Surveying from the Air by an entirely new Photogrammetric method, which has been very successful in Europe, South America and elsewhere.
