### Lipton Wants Yachts Limited to 75 Feet

NEW YORK, March 7.—Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge for the America's Cup will be considered at a special meeting of the New York Yacht Club called by Commodore Pratt for the evening of March 12. Already a difference of opinion has arisen among the club members whether the challenge should be accepted on the terms proposed by Sir Thomas Lipton, that the competing yachts be limited to 75 feet on the water line.

The deed of gift provides that the challenger, if a sloop, may be anywhere from 65 to 90 feet on the water line. The challenger can elect to sail on any water line length, within the designated limits of 65 and 90 feet, and the defender has the same right and the larger craft incurs a penalty of time allowance.

By the deed of gift Sir Thomas can challenge with a 60 foot boat if he desires and the New York Yacht Club can meet him off Sandy Hook with a 90-footer.

### WHEN J. L. SULLIVAN K. O. PADDY RYAN

Water Boy, Now a Millionaire, Revisits the Scene of the Battle in Mississippi.

"That's where John L. Sullivan knocked out Paddy Ryan, Feb. 7, 1882, and became the champion of America. Such was the remark made to the writer by Frank Stuard of Gulfport, Miss., as he rode in the trolley car from Forest Park, three miles east of Gulfport, a few weeks ago.

"Right there back of those two big oak trees, in the exact spot where they battled, continued Mr. Stuard, who was an eye-witness of one of the most famous fights in the history of the world. 'It does not look much as did 31 years ago. Now there are but a few old shacks to mark where once stood Barnes' hotel, one of the best hotels along the Gulf coast. When Ryan and Sullivan fought, there was a beautiful lawn. Now it is grown up with weeds, as the hotel burned eight or ten years ago and the property has been uncared for since.

"Yes, I saw the fight," continued Stuard. "I was born at Hansborough, a town in the county of Wick, Ireland, and pulled the mill here. I was a youngster of 12 when Ryan was training at Barnes' Hotel, while Sullivan was working at the West End in New Orleans. Everyone called this battle was to take place in New Orleans and all the sports assembled, as it was really the greatest prize fight that had been arranged in America up to that time. I was in the crowd, and the champion, who had licked Joe Goss in an eighty-seven round fight in Virginia, two years before. But lots of the sports thought that the 'Boston Boy' was a better man than the 'New Orleans' one.

"As I said before, everyone thought the fight would take place in New Orleans. But there was a sports assembly in Mississippi City that decided upon secretly at the last moment. I remember my father calling me at 6 o'clock that night and telling me the trains were bringing the sports by the thousands from New Orleans to the fight. My father and I got up at 10 o'clock and went to the beach. 'Mississippi City never had the crowd before since that day. The weather was warm for February and pretty soon the sports began to suffer for water. Some of them grabbed their seats as early as 6 o'clock and the fight did not begin until 11 o'clock. The sports were afraid to leave their seats, fearing that someone else would grab them while they were gone. Some of them did, and lost their seats.

"One man, however, was a wise guy. He yelled to me to bring him a drink of water. I obeyed and he handed me a quarter. There never was much Scotch in me, but that gave me an idea. There were hundreds of empty beer bottles around the arena. I got a basket full of them, filled them with water and sold them to the thirsty sports. That was the first money I ever earned and it was no small sum either. I took it to the Stuard is now a millionaire, being engaged in the export of lumber.

"It was about noon when Sullivan and Ryan entered the ring. By that time I had climbed into the saddle of a man's horse and then into the branches of that larger oak tree. Thus, I was right over the two fighters. Stuard was the finest specimen of physical manhood that day that I ever saw. What a model for a statue he would have made. Well, Ryan never had a chance with Sullivan. John L. finally landed right handers on the jaw and put Ryan sprawling in the ninth round. The crowd then hustled back to New Orleans and the lawn looked like a circus ground—the day after. But I was \$20 richer."
