LONDON: All men are potential criminals, and there is no criminal. Type, according to Sir H. Bryan Doukin, a British criminologist. "All formulated doctrines of hereditary crime," he says. "are gravely misleading. Most people could easily be trained in appropriate surroundings to be habitual criminals of one kind or another, what criminals of one kind or another, what ever their innate capacity may be.
Therefore, reform cannot be the sole
object of the state in dealing with the
criminal."

criminal."

The Rev. C. B. Simpson, chaplain inspector of his majesty's prisons, states at the same scientific solutions during his 25 years' experience he had known men and women cured of crime by a single term in prison. In a period of 12 years, he averred, out of 68,000 male first offenders only 6000 were recommitted, and of 12,000 women only 17 went back.

The colef reason why these people

The chief reason why these people keep out of prison, he added, was an aversion to solltude and a very decided mistrust of the charms of one's own ed mistrust of the charms of one's own society for a long period.

"It is almost impossible," said Prof. Benjamin Moore of Liverpool, "to get on without crime, which is to a community what pain is to an individual. It is our business to understand pain, not necessarily to suppress it. Crime is a good thing, because it helps to understand the social order, and we need the stimulus of the political offender to help us to right wrongs."

Prince Kropotkin said prisons do not cure crime, but breed crime by reducins all the vital forces to a minimum.
