

# HORSES Third Day At the Show

## KING EDWARD CHALLENGE CUP WON BY MISS LONG OF KANSAS CITY

Fair Owner Has Another Field Day at Horse Show, Thoroughly Beaten in Combination Class by Col. Kilgour.

The hunters, harness and saddle horses, trotters and ponies held the reins to a fair assembly yesterday afternoon at the show, while a capacity house watched the judges make their awards in the evening in the classes for hunters, combination horses, high stepers and trotters.

Miss Louisa Long had another field day but again saw the blue ribbon go to her rival, who was Col. Kilgour of Sunnybrook Farm, who rode a big bay, was the winner over Nancy Garland, Mrs. McShay's combination was third, the owner showing her own candidate, riding in the side saddle.

The fair Kansas City owner and handler won the King Edward Hotel show, with Realization, an ideal type of fall, round equine, with perfect manners and the driving of Miss Long could not be improved. Mary Grey, owned by Miss El. Vast of Montreal, was awarded the red ribbon. He is a bigger horse than Realization and looks just as good an all round type. It was a close decision, with some of the box critics thought might have been reversed.

In the afternoon in class 4, for mares and geldings exceeding 15.2, hitched to a suitable vehicle, there were seventeen entries and nearly all of them paraded. This was a particularly strong class and the judges were some time in arriving at a decision. Miss Louisa Long of Kansas City had three entries, but the one driven by herself, the best, the winner, was a close decision between Realization, owned by Miss Long, and Wild Rose, owned by Crow and Murray of Toronto.

## PEACE IN ULSTER IS DRAWING NEAR

Such is Consensus of Opinion in Britain—Some Obstacles Ahead.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, April 30.—It is felt that the prospect of peace in Ulster has been so bright, "The Times" parliamentary correspondents' conclusion concerning last night's debate.

"A long way towards peace" is the heading of The Daily Mail's editorial, along the line, pitch themselves in the same hopeful strain, several writers expressing the opinion that the real difficulty in a settlement is not the matter of the Ulster, but the matter of the Ulster, and whether Mr. Asquith is able to control the truculent Radical back bench members.

The Morning Post's Belfast correspondent reports that local Nationalists are both alarmed and indignant, firstly, because the premier has so far taken no drastic steps to deal with the rifle importation, and secondly, because they utterly repudiate Churchill's federal proposals.

Fear Last Ditchers. English Radical newspapers treat the situation rather gingerly. The Daily Chronicle, for instance, while admitting it is impossible to doubt the sincerity of Carson's speech yesterday, says it is equally impossible not to see that he is to a very limited degree, master of the situation. The "Daily Herald" among the Unionists, declares The Chronicle will do all they can to bring Carson's followers into continuing the fight, not an Ulster battle, but the battle for wealth, privilege and aristocracy throughout the United Kingdom, and until this phase is settled "we cannot be too sanguine about anything resulting from the renewal of negotiations."
