C. N. R. RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED THREE AMENDMENTS DEFEATED BILL IS GIVEN FIRST READING

Hon. Mr. Oliver's Proposal That C. N. R. Be Required to Equalize Freight Rates Supported by W. F. Maclean, M.P., Who Also Moved to Acquire Control of Railway.

OTTAWA, May 28. — The Canadian Northern resolutions were adopted by the house of commons tonight. The amendments were not demanded, but the government made upon various amendments was 44. When the result was announced the prime minister introduced a bill founded upon the resolutions and it was read a first time.

Three amendments were moved during the day by Duncan Ross, Hon. Wm. Pugsley and Hon. Frank Oliver, respectively. Mr. Ross desired an investigation by a parliamentary committee, and Mr. Pugsley moved that all the stock of the Canadian Northern be deposited with the receiver-general, the government to secure an option upon the same exercisable within five years upon payment of \$30,000,000. Mr. Oliver asked that the Canadian Northern be required to equalize its freight rates between eastern and western Canada.

The divisions during the day pretty nearly followed party lines. Mr. Bennett of Calgary was absent, but it was explained that he was paired with Mr. Bradbury of Selkirk. Mr. Nickle voted for the Ross and Pugsley amendments, and was paired on equalization of rates. Mr. W. F. Maclean voted with the government on the Ross and Pugsley amendments, but spoke and voted in favor of equality of freight rates.

WESTON-COLONIZATION CO. APPLY FOR WATER

Council Decided to Grant Request If Double Rate is Paid.

An adjourned meeting of the Weston water, power and light commission was held last night, Chairman Wallis Cruikshank presiding. A letter from the secretary, James A. Lundy, of the York Farmers' Colonization Co., Limited, in reference to a supply of water to their farms, was read. The company desired that the main should be carried down the Weston road on the 14-foot strip, which it was donating to the township, to increase the width of the road at that part to 74 feet, and stated that it was willing to bear the cost of the 600 feet of water pipe required in consideration of the village supplying the water. The company stated that a number of people were ready to erect houses on Edmund avenue, and the water could be obtained from a well on the property. Mr. Peirson was instructed to write to the secretary of the company to the effect that the commission would supply water as required at double rates for water supplied within the village, provided the company obtained the agreement of the York Township authorities as to the location of the pipes. The commission will reserve the right to supply water from the proposed main to the other (north) side of the Weston road.

STUDENT NURSES PASSED EXAMS

The names of the successful student nurses who took part in the annual examinations preparing them for work in the hospitals for the insane, conducted by the provincial government, were announced last evening by Dr. Bruce Smith. The report of the board of examiners shows that the system of examinations has proved of great advantage. The efficiency of the hospital staffs has been greatly increased, and every nurse now graduating has a thorough and scientific knowledge of how patients should be treated. As an instance of the practical nature of the course, reference is made to the teaching of dietetics which requires a knowledge of food required for individual cases. Another good feature mentioned is the fact that many patients have been under treatment in their own homes and have never been required to enter an institution. 
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
