

SUPPLY EQUALED DEMAND OF TRADE

Consequently in Some Classes Business Was Rather Quiet.

CHOICE STEERS FIRM

Heavy Weight Steers Were Barely Steady at Former Prices.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Wednesday were 56 carloads, comprising 642 cattle, 1519 hogs, 147 sheep, 113 calves.

The 642 fresh arrivals, combined with several hundred of trade cattle, made a supply that was quite equal to all demands of the trade.

As a consequence, trade for the fat classes, and more especially the heavy weights, was quiet.

But for choice light steers and heifers were firm, while the heavy weight steers were barely steady with Tuesday's quotations.

Cows, bulls and canners sold readily at firm prices. The market opened unexcited, for which there was only a light demand, were not selling quite as well.

Several outside dealers being on hand for a supply of milkers and springers caused values for them to be very firm as usual.

A light supply of veal calves caused the general values for them to be 50c per cwt. higher.

Sheep and lambs were firm at steady values. Although there was a moderately large supply (1512) hogs, drovers were asking more money than they were prepared to part with, and values were very firm at steady quotations.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person before the Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Homestead may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the lands in each of three years after earning homesteaded. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least thirty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of land as homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homesteaded; also fifty acres extra cultivation, as homestead patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Settler must reside six months in each of the three years after earning, and erect a house worth \$300.

Reduction in cost of rough scrubby stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
