MAKE PRESENTATION TO MR. AND MRS. BENJAMIN

Congregation of Holy Blossom and Affiliated Societies Honor Departing Friends.

A pleasing function took place at the vestry chambers of The Holy Blossom, Toronto, Hebrew congregation. It was the presentation of an illuminated address and souvenir to Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Benjamin on the eve of their departure from Toronto to take up their residence permanently in London, England. Leo Frankel, who has been elected to succeed Mr. Benjamin as president of the congregation, occupied the chair. On the arrival of Mrs. Benjamin she was presented with a bouquet of flowers by Miss Lisa Jacobs. Rabbi Jacobson, Messrs. E. Scheraga, H. N. Samuel, H. N. Looser, E. Saunders, H. Davis, J. S. The chairman presented, on behalf of the congregation, a most beautiful and valuable gift, which Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin had been connected, the following address:

"To Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Benjamin: On the eve of your leaving Toronto to reside in England, we take this opportunity of expressing on behalf of ourselves and the institutions we represent, the heartfelt regret we feel at your departure."

"We assure you that words fail us adequately to convey the high esteem we entertain for you, and our sorrow at your departure. For seven years you have filled the office of president of the Holy Blossom congregation. During that period you have zealously and incessantly labored for its welfare, and with such commendable prudence administered its affairs, that the congregation has attained an eminent and honored position."

"You have also been an active worker in the sacred cause of charity, sparing neither time nor effort for the alleviation of the sufferings of the poor. Your gifts have been many and generous. Your long association with us, and active interest in the management of the affairs of the Toronto Jewish Benevolent Society, will be an everlasting example and an inspiration to its members. Likewise as treasurer of the local branch of the Anglo-Jewish Association you manifested your sympathy with our oppressed brethren in distant lands."

"You, Mrs. Benjamin, as treasurer of the Ladies' Montefiore Society, have worked nobly and unostentatiously for the sick and poor, and sacrificed much of your time for their welfare. On all occasions your services were rendered graciously and unsparringly, neither wind nor weather preventing your visits to the bedside of the afflicted and the homes of the bereaved."

"As a teacher in our Hebrew and religious classes, you have sown the golden seeds of our religion, and by your patience and ability endeared yourself to the little ones."

"You have likewise done excellent work in connection with the sewing classes conducted under the auspices of the Council of Jewish Women, thus better equipping the girls for their future duties. You have also served the latter institution as honorary secretary with diligence for years."

"You have indeed ably seconded your worthy husband in every good cause tending to the welfare of the community, the advancement of Judaism and the benefit of mankind."

"We ask you, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin, to accept the accompanying gift as a token of our esteem and appreciation."

"We fervently hope that the blessings of our Almighty Father may be with you during the remainder of your lives, and that you may for many years, be able to see your son follow the good example you have set him."

Mr. Benjamin received and was greeted on all sides by an ovation which fully expressed the high regard and esteem entertained for him. A suitable memento of the occasion was likewise presented to Master Ernest Frank Benjamin.

The whole proceedings were characteristic of good taste, and the vestry room was handsomely decorated under the direction of Messrs. Frankel and Goldstein."

The address, executed by A. H. Howard, R.C.A., consists of a supercilious piece, decorated with a miniature painting of Holy Blossom Synagogue within a border of myrtle, followed by three pages of text matter in black letter characters, relieved by richly decorated initials and marginal tracery, the motifs for which have been found in the cloven and everlasting flower, each of which, including the myrtle, has a distinct significance in Jewish symbolism; then follows the pages of signatures on behalf of the various institutions participating.
