Geneva, Dec. 16 .- The international Red Cross here has received a message from Constantinople stating that the bubonic plague continues to spread alarmingly in the city, especially in the poorer quarters. There have also been cases in the European quarters. The government has placarded the treets demanding that the people undergo vaccination and has ordered the closing of the schools, mosques, restaurants, cafes, public buildings and the suspension of the tramways.



Mother Discovers Infant in New York Hospital, Whither He


Had Been Taken After Abandonment by Un-

HYDRO RADIAL ORDER THRU BY NEW YEAR






