SUBURBAN COMPANY HAVE LOST NO TIME

Await Permission to Build Thru Swansea—East Toronto Council Rush Thru Work.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Aug. 12.—Residents of the Junction, as well as of Swansea, will be gratified to know that the Toronto Suburban Railway Company will construct a railroad from the Junction down thru Swansea to the Lake Shore-road. The route was surveyed on Saturday last, and the work will commence just as soon as the by-laws are passed and agreements ratified. The company are anxious to have the work commenced as speedily as possible, so the council of Toronto Junction and York Township are preparing plans and discussing the proposed routes. The plans engineered by George C. Royce, manager of the Toronto Suburban Railway Company, seem the most suitable and will likely be adopted. Mr. Royce proposes that the route be along South Keele-street to Annette, and along Annette to Elizabeth-street, thence down, thru Swansea, connecting with the Lake Shore-road at the Bolt Works.

Should the residents object too vigorously to the laying of tracks on Annette-street, the route will be along Dundas to Louise and down Louise to Elizabeth-street.

William Speers & Co., undertakers, are having their barn cemented, and the rigs have been transferred to the newly stable till the work is completed. Robert Paterson, secretary-treasurer of the Maxwell-Harris Mining Company, left last night for Cobalt and Larder Lake, where he has extensive mining interests.

About 11.30 to-day a team of horses, hitched to a brick wagon, got frightened and bolted on West Dundas-street. Before being stopped, one horse was badly injured. Dundas-street is in such a bad condition that heavy traffic there is almost impossible. This morning half a load of flour fell off a wagon, and some of the bags burst. Later in the day a barrel of oil belonging to the Queen City Oil Company was jolted off the wagon.

The stonework and masonry on the new Bank of British North America is completed, and the derricks used for hoisting the stonework into position are being taken down.

Mr. Hall of Wiloughby-avenue, popularly known as Doc, leaves to-morrow for a month's vacation at Orchard Beach, Maine.

The water pressure at the Junction fire hall to-day was only 29 lbs. The usual pressure all summer has been from 35 to 40 lbs., but to be adequate for fire of much proportion 80 lbs. would be necessary. The pressure here is 125 lbs., and we cannot do any better. The reply received from the pumping station this afternoon when the engineer was notified by one of the firemen as to the condition of affairs, in Carlton there was no water pressure at all, and the people could not even get sufficient water from the taps for domestic purposes.

Fred Connolly, one of the Toronto Junction firemen, left this morning for a two weeks' vacation, and there is a persistent rumor that is to be confirmed before his return. The lady is Miss Griffin of Carlton West, and the report says that after the ceremony the happy couple will spend a short vacation at the home of relatives at the other side of the international boundary.

RICHMOND HILL.
Scarcity of Water Hinders Local Firemen in Sharp Blaze.

RICHMOND HILL, Aug. 12.—A destructive fire took place in the village on Saturday when the frame residence of Mrs. Mayes on Centre-street, as well as the adjoining building of Mr. Deadman were burned to the ground. The flames spread so rapidly after the fire was first noticed that little could be done to save the contents, and these were for the most part destroyed together with a considerable sum of money belonging to Mrs. Mayes.

The fire originated in the latter's kitchen, following the lighting of a fire in the stove, after which Mrs. Mayes left the house for a few moments. Nearby houses on either side, only a few feet distant, were saved by the hard work of the local firemen. The water supply was very inefficient, and the efforts of the brigade were hampered owing to this cause.

The damage will probably amount to \$1000 in each case, but the amount of insurance, if any, is not known. Mrs. Edna Barker is absent on a short visit to the city. NEW DREADNOUGHT TO BE EVEN LARGER

Battleship of 30,000 Tons Roused Talk of \$20,000,000 Yankee Monster.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Naval circles are agitated over a report that the British admiralty is about to lay down the keel for a ship that will be 50 per cent. greater in tonnage than the Dreadnought. It is difficult to secure information respecting the plans, and it is said that the British government is again proceeding, as in the case of the Dreadnought, to build the vessel behind closed gates. Thus the British navy can be kept at least two years ahead of any other country, at least in theory; in these days a battleship is frequently obsolete in five years.

It is understood that the new ship is to be of 30,000 tons displacement, against 20,000 tons of the Dreadnought, and to include many novelties, for instance, three guns in each turret, so the new ship will carry eighteen guns in her main battery. The report of the British plan has caused the bolder spirits among the American ship designers to propose to lay down a battleship of 40,000 tons displacement, placing the American navy clearly in the lead. Such a ship would cost no less than \$20,000,000.

Another arrest was made to-day in the person of James Wadsworth at Queenston, who allowed his place to be made a fence for stolen goods. This is the place where the 800 pounds of butter was found. MUST ANSWER QUESTIONS.

Harriman and Kuhn Can Not Defy the U. S. Courts.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—United States District Attorney Stimson to-day filed in the United States circuit court in this city a petition that E. H. Harriman and Otto H. Kuhn, the latter of the firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., be summoned into court to show cause why they should not answer certain questions relating to the control of the Chicago & Alton Railroad. These questions were asked during the interstate commerce commission's investigation of the Chicago & Alton several months ago. Mr. Stimson acted for Attorney-General Bonaparte in filing the petition.
