THE TORONTO WORLD EAST TORONTO IS EAGER TO ENTER CIVIC FOLD

No Special Privileges Wanted—Deer Park and Wychwood Representatives Again Appeal.

The board of control was waited upon yesterday by deputations representing East Toronto, Deer Park and Wychwood. The visitors representing the first named municipality came with a united front to request annexation, while some opposition was voiced by certain property owners of Deer Park and Wychwood, where it appears that the issue is developing into one between "the classes and the masses."

YORK TOWNSHIP COUNCIL. Big Deputation From Swansea Have Diverse Views.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, Oct. 7.—A letter was received at to-day's council meeting from H. E. Irwin, clerk of the peace, stating that the municipality is required to return the following jurors: Grand jurors for high court, 18; Grand jurors for inferior court, 18; Petit jurors for high court, 108; Petit jurors for inferior court, 108.

W. J. Kerr wrote asking if the township intends naming street running south of Danforth-ave. from Harris' glue factory to Grand Trunk Railway, and to number the houses, as the post-man refused to deliver the daily mail unless the street was named and the houses numbered. He suggested the name of "Eugene-crescent."

In a letter the physician-in-chief of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives asked for a light on Buttonwood-avenue from the Weston-road to the hospital.

J. W. Fisher desires to have his house, which is located at 18 Hamblay-avenue, lighted with electricity, and asked permission to erect poles and electric wires to the house. The township solicitor E. A. Forster, on behalf of his client, Mr. White, of Bathurst-street and Vaughan-avenue, asked to have the stones piled against his fence removed and the fence repaired. Referred to the road commissioner.

Manager Royce of the Toronto Suburban Railway Co. presented his application for running rights from Toronto Junction to Swansea via Elizabeth-street, to College-street, to Dundas-avenue, to the waterfront.

Dr. W. G. L. Spaulding was the first speaker and stated that the company wished to put the best street in the city. The company is evidently anxious to carry out the project, but the people of Swansea are not in favor of it. Another reason why Ellis-avenue should not be considered as a railway route is on account of recent sanitary researches, which show that metallic currents are not beneficial to the human system.

Mr. Rennie said that not the people on Ellis-avenue are anxious to have the railway, but those north of Swansea are. Mr. Rennie would have the railway around the church, and every member of that church is opposed to it. An alternative route is proposed to the north of the church, and the company would build their own roadway.

Mr. Major said that he had canvassed the people in Swansea in the railway company's interest and that he desired to get the road thru, but the people of Swansea. The railway company should not consider the Toronto Junction as a main line.

Mr. Ellis and Reeve Henry had a wordy duel for a few minutes, when Mr. Ellis asserted that Ellis-avenue was constructed by the private owners of that street out of private funds, and that the price was accepted by the farmer of \$4.75 per acre per year, and summer season begins is more acceptable to the dealers.
