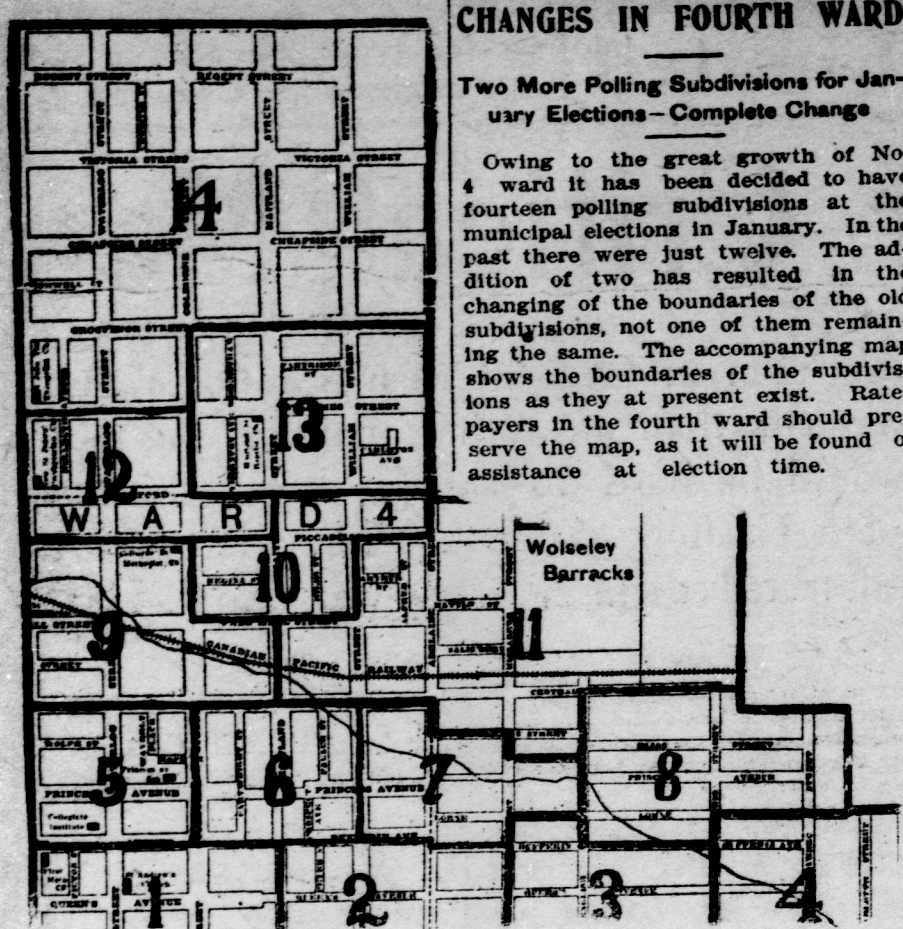




## CHANGES IN FOURTH WARD

Two More Polling Subdivisions for January Elections—Complete Change

Owing to the great growth of No. 4 ward it has been decided to have fourteen polling subdivisions at the municipal elections in January. In the past there were just twelve. The addition of two has resulted in the changing of the boundaries of the old subdivisions, not one of them remaining the same. The accompanying map shows the boundaries of the subdivisions as they at present exist. Ratepayers in the fourth ward should preserve the map, as it will be found of assistance at election time.

**Appeals to the Court**

Mr. Curry and Mr. DuVernet again got into a tangle over the matter of questioning and Mr. DuVernet appealed to the court.

The magistrate supported Mr. DuVernet, deciding that Stevely's evidence was very important. "If what he said about these money is not true we should know it," he said.

**Curry Wants a Fair Show**

Mr. Curry declared that a great deal of the evidence taken at the investigation was illegal and that the prosecution had shown no disposition to give the defense a fair show.

"That's not right," declared Mr. DuVernet. "I am doing what I can to clear up the case now."

"I am always suspicious of the Greeks when they come offering presents," Mr. Curry retorted.

Gordon Murray, who was employed by John Stevely at the time of the by-election, said he knew of no boy in Stevely's office as Fred Allen.

**Mr. Hutchinson Called**

Francis Hutchinson, West London, was then called.

"What is your occupation?"

"Teamster."

"Did you get any money at the election?"

"Yes, \$10."

"Jerry Collins."

"What for?"

"He didn't say."

"What election did you get the money?"

"The by-election."

"Did anybody canvass you?"

"No."

"Did you see Sifton or Lewis?"

"No."

"How did you know you were to get the money?"

"Mrs. Wootton told me that Collins wanted to see me at Lewis' between 11 and 11 o'clock. I went and saw Collins and he told me he had \$10 for me."

"What did he say?"

"He said it was out of a kind of election fund."

"Did you sign a receipt?"

"I don't remember."

"How many times did you get money from Collins?"

"Once before; in the Robson-Routledge election I got \$5."

"Did you get money from anyone else?"

"No; Collins was the only one."

"The money was for your vote?"

"No."

"What was it for?"

"At 3 o'clock, after I had voted, on election day, Collins told me there was \$5 in an envelope for me if I voted right. I got the money two days after the election."

"Were you offered money by anyone else?"

"Yes, a man named Stevens."

"What did he tell you?"

**Says Got Money From Toote**

"He told me that Dick Toote had given him \$25 to spend on the election."

Stevens and two men named Routledge and McKinley were produced in court, and Hutchinson identified Stevens as the man who had offered the money.

"What did you tell him?"

"That he hadn't enough money to buy my vote."

"Did anybody else offer you anything?"

"Yes. Routledge offered me a load of hay to vote for Gray."

"Did you get the hay later from him?"

"Well, it was dumped in my yard."

**Stevens Denies**

Stevens was called and he denied that he had ever offered money to Hutchinson. Routledge was also placed in the box and he swore that he had never offered to give Hutchinson a load of

asked Mr. Curry, or will you wait until all the evidence has been typewritten?"

"All the evidence will be written by Wednesday," said Mr. DuVernet.

Mr. Curry intimated that there was much so-called evidence taken which does not bear on this case, and he intends to have something to say about this matter when the case is resumed on Wednesday.

"Much of the evidence should not be submitted to the grand jury, and I want an opportunity to read the evidence and weed out the objectionable matter," said Mr. Curry.

The magistrate said he would not commit until Mr. Curry had read the evidence.

## REFUSES TO COMMIT.

Magistrate Says Mr. McCormick's Evidence Doesn't Warrant Such Action.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—A small, red-covered memorandum book containing a list of voters and amounts alleged to have been paid, with the initials of the men who held the money opposite each name, was produced by the crown at the London election bribery investigation yesterday in the police court. This book belonged to James McCormick, a member of the Liberal committee of the second ward in London, who declared that it had been stolen from his desk by some individual interested in securing evidence for the crown. Mr. McCormick has been ill, and he stated that he came here yesterday against the instructions of his physician. He was the first witness to take the stand when the court resumed yesterday afternoon. Before he was asked to step down Mr. DuVernet, the prosecuting counsel, asked for an order of committal, asserting that the witness had not told the truth, and had denied absolutely that he had paid \$5 on two different occasions to Leo Edwards, a tea merchant, for his votes in the last general and by-elections in London.

Magistrate Denison stated he could not make the order until some contradictory evidence was put in. Mr. DuVernet then asked the court to see that McCormick remained in the city over night, but the magistrate replied that the witness could go home if he wished. Another subpoena was served upon Mr. McCormick before he left the court, and he will be called this morning.

The examination of McCormick was marked by some interruptions on the part of the counsel for the defense. Mr. DuVernet stated that if it was not discontinued he would be obliged to inform the Attorney-General that the witness had withdrawn from the case. The magistrate requested the counsel to defer their objections to him. Mr. J. W. Curry, K.C., who was retained yesterday to act with Messrs. John M. Godfrey and George Wilkie on behalf of the defense, vigorously protested against the evidence of McCormick being used against the defendants. He argued that different statements made by several people to the witness could not be put in as evidence against the defendants unless any of them made the assertion. The objection was overruled.

At this juncture the little red book was introduced for the witness to peruse. He had refused to answer any questions until it was put in his hands. He stated that the memorandum concerning the elections had been put in it during the past three months. This information was taken from another memorandum book for the purpose of production before the investigating court. He had a particular reason for doing so.

The items in the new book were an exact copy of those in the old book at the time of the election. In reply to a question by the magistrate, McCormick said that he was not acquainted with some of those included in the list of names, having possibly jotted down some names for canvassing purposes.

"I think he is a hostile witness and is not telling the truth," said Mr. DuVernet.

"This witness has not been reticent," rejoined Mr. Curry.

The initials "P. L." appeared after some of the names in the book. "Are they intended for Philip Lewis?" asked Mr. DuVernet. McCormick replied that he did not know any name that he could connect with them. The crown was unable to get any further information concerning the initials. McCormick said that he never paid any money to voters, but had used his own money to buy cigars for a number of men in his ward. He had canvassed Edwards, but never paid him money.

—Mr. George C. Gibbons, K.C., chairman of the Canadian section of the waterways commission, is in Ottawa attending a meeting of the section today.

—The firemen had a call about 8 o'clock last evening to the West London dump, where boys had ignited a quantity of rubbish. The blaze was easily distinguished. Fires at the dump have been quite frequent of late.

—Mrs. Charles Johns, of 39 Stanley street, left for Omaha, Neb., last evening owing to the serious illness of her oldest daughter, Mrs. R. H. Manson. A message received a day or two ago was to the effect that Mrs. Manson was very low and her recovery was exceedingly doubtful, but a subsequent telegram reported an improvement, with a possibility of the patient recovering.

—The non-support charge preferred against Isiah Antoine was withdrawn by his wife at the courthouse this afternoon. Antoine belongs to the Caradoc reserve, and it appears that although he owns a house, he has been

living with his father. Mrs. Antoine objected to living with her father-in-law and she went to live with her mother. Now, however, she has consented to rejoin her husband, the latter having agreed to start housekeeping again in his own humble cottage.

The total returns for the London Clearing House for the week ending Nov. 8, 1906, were \$1,514,772. For the corresponding week of 1905 the figures were \$1,145,820, showing the large increase of \$368,952.

The till at the Ideal Billiard Parlors, on King street, between Clarence and Richmond streets, was tapped this morning, \$7 or \$8 being secured. The theft was committed before the place was opened for the day. There is no clue whatever to the identity of the thief or thieves.

## STOCK MARKETS.

H. C. Beecher, stockbroker, received the following by private wire from Bartlett, Frazier & Carrington today:

New York, Nov. 8.—Noon.—The market is strong, but almost wholly devoid of any features of interest.

Northern Pacific enjoyed a further advance, although in usually well-informed quarters it is not believed that any distribution will be made to the stockholders until December. The principal topic of conversation has been the possibility of relief to the financial situation from Secretary Shaw. One idea is that had the Bank of England advanced its rate today, the secretary would have taken prompt action; but as that institution has left the rate a 6 per cent, the secretary will now do nothing until he has been assured that the slow trade of commercial is having a detrimental effect on the business of the country. He is expected to return to Washington tomorrow, when it is possible some more definite information will be obtainable.

Rates for money have been somewhat lower than yesterday, no loans having been made above 6 1/2, while renewal rates have varied from 6 to 6 1/2. This moderate decline in rates is thought by some to be an indication that Saturday's bank statement will not make an unfavorable exhibit. Shortly after the opening the market relapsed into dullness and now is almost wholly in the hands of the professional traders. Sales to noon 243,700.
