We have lately been able to secure band instruments of the 162nd Battalion for \$700—which originally cost \$2,200—and the original officers of the battalion who are now stationed in England, have undertaken to try and raise this money from our friends at home, and have already received \$100 from Chatham and we also expect subscriptions from Windsor, Sarnia, Stratford

The statement follows: 'The night was marked by a violent bombardment, followed by a series of new German attacks on the whole front, before Braye-En-Laonnois, Epine-de-Chevregny and the Hurtebise monument. All efforts of the enemy infantry to penetrate our lines were repulsed completely, and its losses were very heavy.

"There was active artillery fighting in the Champagne, at Mont Haut, and on both banks of the Meuse.'

STOUT HEARTS, STERN HANDS, RUSSIA'S NEED
