## NOTE AND COMMENT

Canadians are a unit in their loyalty to Longboat and the committee that endorsed his entry. It is inconceivable that a protest from Boss Sullivan will avail anything. He is probably endeavoring to make good his threats, issued before leaving his adopted country, that the Indians could not start in the marathon. However, Sullivan's latest phase is likely only a piece of bluff, and when the date of the big race comes round Longboat will be in line with the rest at the start, and anywhere from a hundred yards to a mile ahead of them at the finish.

Next Tuesday the Olympic games begin with field and track athletes and cycling morning and afternoon, and it is possible that Longboat will contest the shot put just as a test to see the Sullivan-taught Yankees collapse.

Brighton Beach is the only one of the big eastern jockey clubs failing to keep faith with the horsesmen. The Beach's thirteenth season began yesterday. 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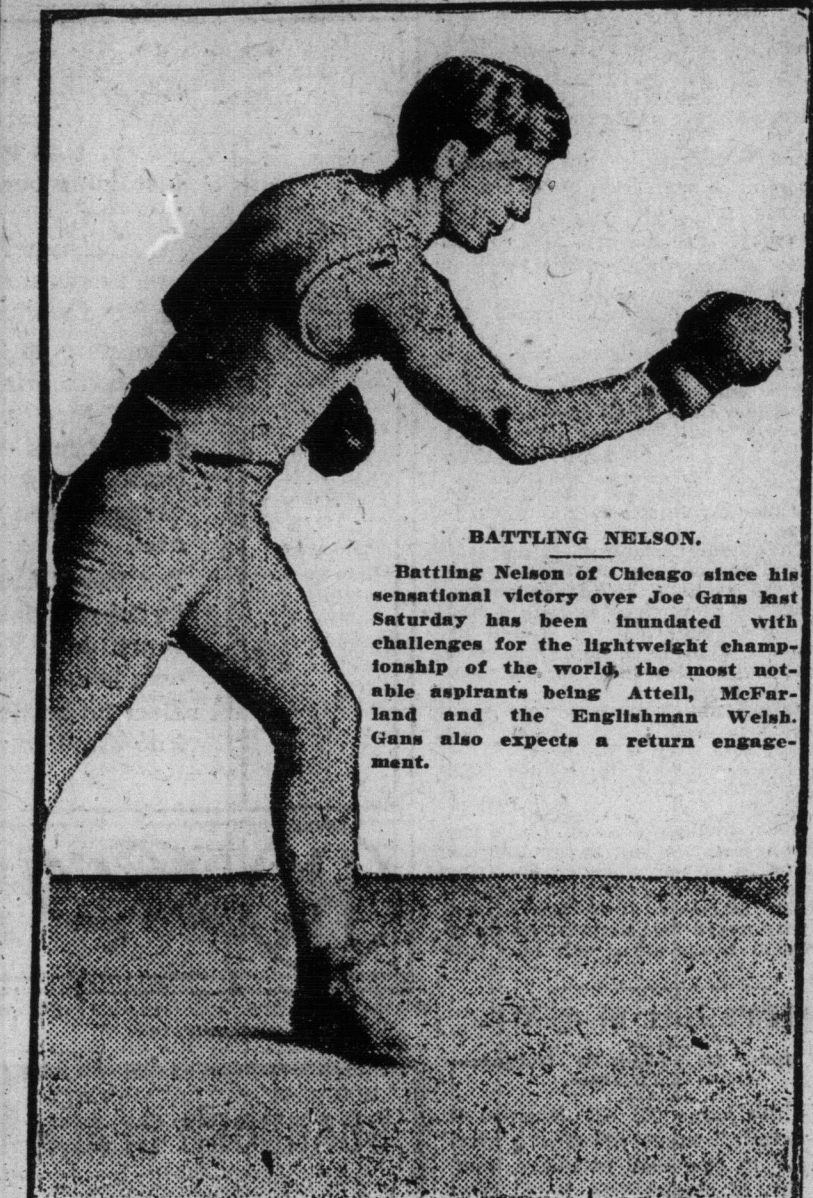
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BATTILING NELSON.

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## GERMAN WINS GRAND PRIX.

Two Men Killed in Great Auto Race at Dieppe.

DIEPPE, July 7.—The Grand Prix, the blue ribbon of the automobile world, was won to-day by a German, Leutenschlager, driving a Mercedes car. His time was 6 hours 53 minutes 43 seconds, and his average rate of speed 112.2 kilometres, or 69.9 miles an hour.

There were numerous accidents, and two men were killed outright. Classes in a Panhard, and his mechanic, Schaub, were caught under their car and horribly crushed. They died in a hospital.

The German victory was not popular. Still the immense crowd, numbering nearly a million, cheered the Leutenschlager with right good will.

German cars also captured second and third places, while another German cut down the Bieppe track record by one hour and 45 minutes.
