PROVINCIAL BANK REPORT

Business in 1909 Showed a Great Increase.

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—(Special).—The report of last year's work of the Provincial Bank of Canada, which has forty branches in Quebec and two in New Brunswick, is out, showing that whereas 13,741 depositors placed \$3,900,000 in the bank during 1908, some 24,100 depositors placed no less than \$14,844,000 during the past year.
