Mischievous Talk of Peace

Statement Made By Sir Edward Carson

Time Has Not Arrived

German Militarism Must be Crushed and People Made to See That Their Forces Are Not Invincible

London, Sept. 7.—Coincidentally with the announcement that Premier Lloyd George will deliver an important speech on the war aims of the Allies at Birkenhead today, the newspapers give prominence to a statement by Sir Edward Carson to a correspondent. He declares:—"There is a great deal of very loose and mischievous talk about peace. Some people seem to imagine we have only to conclude a treaty with Germany and all will be well, but I should like to ask what is to happen then? Are the nations of the world to proceed with preparations for the next conflict, to pursue their researches in science for expansion and creation of still more deadly weapons of warfare, to spend their resources in the creation of enormous cohorts of airplanes and submarines for the destruction of unfortified towns and the murder of innocent women and children that inhabit them; to take advantage of the experiences gained in the war in the improvement of lethal and poisonous gases for the destruction of humanity? And are we to live in daily terror that at any moment another conflict may arise which might almost lead to the extinction of civilization itself? Germany's Broken Promises.

"The truth is a treaty of peace does not necessarily secure peace in the only sense wherein it can be of any real use to progress and humanity. We talk platitudes about a league of nations to enforce peace without considering conditions essential to its success. But there was a league of nations to protect Belgium; there were solemn treaties and conventions at the Hague to apply the principles of humanity as far as possible in war and give effect to international law. How did these avail on the outbreak of the war?"

Sir Edward then quotes the German emperor as saying there is no international law, that treaties are scraps of paper and so forth, and adds:—"I have not yet seen a single suggestion made as to how in future these calamities are to be prevented from recurring if the lawless temper of the Germans remains unrepentant and their power to repeat their crimes remains intact. It has been in the past relatively to the rest of the world.

"President Wilson is right when he declares no terms signed by the present rulers of Germany would afford the slightest security for the peace of the world, and nothing is more certain than that in proportion as the military defeat of Germany is incomplete the duration of peace will be short. Whatever terms Germany might now bring herself to accept in order to recuperate her strength for another aggression, her people would soon forget such terms and the aggressors they have had to endure and would remain convinced that they proved themselves inviolable.

Sir Edward asserted that if this war is to put an end to all war, German militarism must be sufficiently crushed to make fresh aggression by it impossible for a long time to come, and until it is no longer possible for the German people themselves to be deluded by the legend of their invincibility in arms." In conclusion he said that it was obvious that Great Britain must carry on the war until such a victory is attained as will remove all practical danger of a new aggression, "and any man who tries, whatever his motive be, to distract the attention of the country from this goal of deliverance is the worst enemy of real peace."

The Murder Of a Family of Eight Laid To Minister

All Were Slain With Axe As They Slept

Parents and Six Children

In Alleged Confession, Afterwards Repudiated, Clergyman Said to Have Confessed and Given Scripture Texts as Reason For Crime

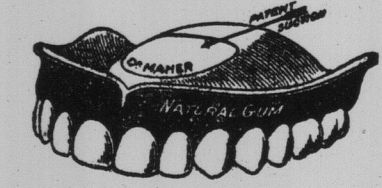
Red Oak, Iowa, Sept. 7.—Rev. Lyn George J. Kelly has been placed on trial in the District Court here on an indictment charging him with the murder of Lena Stillinger, aged eleven, one of eight persons slain with an axe at the house of J. B. Moore, in Villisca, Iowa, on June 9, 1912. A special venire of seventy-five men was called from which to select a jury.

The clergyman, an itinerant, is said to have made a confession, which, however, he afterward repudiated. In his alleged confession Kelly was quoted as having said that the Biblical texts "Slay utterly" and "Suffer little children to come unto me," impelled him to kill Moore, the latter's wife and their four children, besides the Stillinger child and one other girl.

Kelly was arrested on May 14. He pleaded not guilty May 15, and was removed to the county jail at Logan, where the alleged confession was made. The arrest of the clergyman marked the most startling of a series of sensational events growing out of the murders at Villisca, a city of 2,000 population, in Montgomery County, where to find one of its homes a shambles, a family of six and two girls visiting it the victims of an axe murderer. The axe, covered with blood, was found in one of the rooms.

The crime was committed in the home of Joe B. Moore, an implement dealer, and the victims, slain as they slept, were Moore forty-three, his wife, thirty-nine; their four children, Herman, eleven; Katherine, ten; Boyd, seven, and Paul, five, and two neighborhood

children, Lena Stillinger, eleven, and her sister, Ina, aged eight.

On man was taken into custody, but was released because of insufficient evidence.

J. N. Wilkerson, a Kansas City detective, became associated with the investigation, and in the spring of 1916 William Mansfield returned here to face a grand jury investigation, which ended with the refusal of that body to indict him.

Wilkerson began holding public mass meetings, and as the result of certain utterances he is alleged to have made F. F. Jones, a merchant of Villisca and a former state senator, brought suit against the detective for \$60,000 damages, charging the detective with slander.

After a sensational trial in November, 1916, Wilkerson was acquitted. The defense introduced evidence intended to show implication of Jones and his son, Albert, in the axe murders.

H. M. Havner assumed the office of attorney general of Iowa in 1917, and with a special assistant appointed for the case, appeared before the grand jury with the announced intention of refuting the charges against Jones.

In April Jones and his son were exonerated by the grand jury, which later renewed and indicted Kelly.

Wilkerson, the detective, declared Kelly had no connection with the crime, and the controversy between Kelly and the state department of justice became bitter. Attorney General Havner finally obtained a temporary injunction re-

straining Wilkerson from holding further years ago. He was graduated from a public meetings in Iowa or seeking to influence witnesses or officials connected with the trial of Kelly.

Kelly is married and came to the United States from England about ten years ago. He was graduated from a seminary in Omaha in 1912. At the time of the axe murders he was a student at the seminary, but preached at Macedonia, Iowa, and Villisca on alternate Sundays.
