HON. L. P. TILLEY PLEASES WITH ONTARIO LIQUOR VOTE RESULT

SEES DEFINITE
MOVE TO HANDLE
BAD SITUATION

Declares O. T. A. Was Un-
workable and a Living
Hypocrisy

PREMIER SILENT ON
SITUATION IN N. B.

Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith and H.
A. Powell, K. C., Com-
ment on Matter

IN VIEW of speculation in re-
gard to the effect the result of
the Ontario election yesterday
would have on the liquor situa-
tion here, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter,
Premier of the province, was
asked this morning if any change
in the present New Brunswick
liquor act was contemplated.
He replied that so far as this
province was concerned the govern-
ment had not considered the
matter.

HON. MR. TILLEY PLEASED

Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, chairman
of the Executive Council of the
Government of New Brunswick, was
interviewed as he was enroute to
the depot for Halifax where he will
leave by the steamer Chaleur to-
morrow for a rest in the West.
When asked if he had any objec-
tion to being quoted in the press upon
the result of the Ontario election he
unhesitatingly said that he had
no objection. "I am glad," said
Tilley, "that the Province of Ontario
has swung into line with the rest
of western Canada in deciding to
take firm and systematic action
upon liquor question. Yesterday's
vote should demonstrate very fully to
the people of Canada that there is
a living hypocrisy. No law, I feel,
should remain on the statute books
of any government that can not be
upheld by general public opinion."
When Mr. Tilley was asked if he
felt the Ontario result would have
a reflex influence upon New
Brunswick Government in dealing
with the liquor law now operating
as a prohibitive measure, he said it
was not for him to say or to express
any opinion. "That was for the
Government as a whole to decide. His
own personal views on the workability
of present prohibitive legislation
was well known and indeed he was
the subject of mixed comment after
public utterances of some time ago.

HON. DR. E. A. SMITH.

Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, of Shediac,
Minister of Lands and Mines in the
Government of the Hon. J. V. Miller,
expressed his feelings in the matter
of the Ontario election in much the
same vein as his old political opponent
the Hon. L. P. D. Tilley.
"Pleased me greatly," was the Doc-
tor's emphatic comment. "Grit and
all as I am, I would have voted Con-
servative in Ontario yesterday had I
been privileged to do so," he said with
emphasis. The Doctor then went on
to give his personal views on prohibi-
tion and Government control. "Which
"You will remember," he said, "that
former Premier Veniot offered to give
the people of New Brunswick the op-
portunity of settling this question
through a plebiscite. However, Premier
Baxter does not seem to have the
courage to do so. He seems to have
felt sure of his election via the
Conservative route and that was all he wanted."

DR. POWELL'S VIEWS.

H. A. Powell, K. C., who was de-
parting for Moncton the noon train
on private matters, talked generally
of the result in Ontario but confined
his pertinent remarks to reminiscent
instances of the effect of some restric-
tive legislation against the sale of
liquor in days when the question was
not so broad and prominent as it
is today.
"When a young man I used to visit
the late Sir Leonard Tilley quite fre-
quently, at a time when the great
statesman was in the heat of his polit-
ical activities. Shortly after he had
introduced a prohibitory measure for
New Brunswick—a measure which
was shortly withdrawn—he said to
me: 'Powell, I think I have intro-
duced this prohibitive measure far too
soon, the people do not seem to be
ready for it.'"
Doctor Powell also discussed some
of the moral phases of prohibitory
legislation in liquor traffic as he
under his notice in a long and diver-
sified practice. He particularly stressed
a weakening of the sanctity of an
oath in cases where citizens were called

SUM OF \$15,993 PAID TODAY TO CALL FIREMEN

Name of Alfred Belyea Is
to Remain on
Roster

CITY HOLDS BACK
\$4,375 FOR TAXES

Ferry Report for November
Shows Revenue Lower
and Traffic Lighter

The 90 men on the call firemen list
received their pay today at City Hall,
less the amount of taxes the city as-
sessed against them in 1926. The total
of the pay roll was \$20,268.75, and from
this was deducted \$4,375.73 for taxes,
making the total cash paid out \$15,993.

W. S. Vaughan, chief of the fire de-
partment, was at the City Hall this
morning if Alfred Belyea, about whom the recent
difficulty arose, was still one of the
call firemen, and he replied that, so
far as he knew, Mr. Belyea was still
on the list. The call men were ap-
pointed by the city in 1924, and from
this was deducted \$4,375.73 for taxes,
making the total cash paid out \$15,993.

FERRY IN NOVEMBER.
The report of the ferry superintendent
for November shows a falling off in
revenue of \$208.96, as compared with
the same month of 1926. There is also
a falling off in the number of passen-
gers, 678, as compared with 713 in
November of 1926. Decrease in
amount of expenditure to date.

The figures are: 1926, number of
passengers, 678; revenue, \$1,888.86;
1925, number of passengers, 713;
revenue, \$2,097.82. Decrease in
revenue, \$208.96. Decrease in
number of passengers, 35; decrease in
amount of expenditure, \$224.96.

For the year the expenditure for the
first 11 months was \$86,917.92; this
year it was \$89,026.80, a saving of
\$2,108.88. The revenue for the same
period was \$102,570.11, and there is still
a credit balance of \$9,643.31 in the
department.

FOURTEEN WRITING
PLUMBERS' TESTS

Dr. G. G. Melvin, W. J. Craw-
ford and J. Henneberry Are
Examiners

Fourteen candidates are taking ex-
aminations for plumbers' tests here
today. The examinations are written
and oral and are being conducted by
Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief medical exam-
iner, W. J. Crawford and Joseph Hen-
neberry. The examinations were com-
menced this morning and are being
continued this afternoon. The mas-
tery of those taking the examinations
are newcomers to the trade, most of
the other plumbers being registered. Ar-
rangements were made yesterday after-
noon at a meeting of the examining
board to prosecute all plumbers who
were following their trade without be-
ing registered.

and will confer with Dr. Melvin on
matters pertaining to their depart-
ments. Some announcement concerning

Taylor's departure from the city.
There was only one case of small-
pox in New Brunswick during the last
year, said Dr. Melvin relative to
an inaccuracy in an interview with
the press.

Admiral Kingsmill
To Sail On Melita

Among the passengers sailing on the
Canadian Pacific S. S. Melita to-
morrow will be Admiral Kingsmill, head
of the Canadian navy. Captain A. H.
Tolney, commander of the vessel, said
this morning that he expected to sail
at 9 o'clock tomorrow evening. The
Melita will stop for Cherbourg, South-
ampton and Antwerp and will lay up
for four weeks at the latter port for
the purpose of being overhauled. She
will not return to this port until about
January 28.

Saint John Redemptorists Conduct 85 Missions And Retreats Since February

Widespread Work is Directed From St. Peter's Church, in the North End, and Carried On in Maritimes and Elsewhere

WHILE it is generally known that the Redemptorist Order of the Catholic priesthood is a missionary one, it is recognized by few how extensive is the work along these lines directed from St. Peter's Church in Saint John, or how widespread are the missionary activities of the priests who make up the staff of the North End church.

A Times-Star reporter's question to Rev. James Cloran, rector of St. Peter's, brought out some interesting information of the local work of the priests of the Congregation of the Most Sacred Redeemer—C.S.S.R.

Approximately 85 missions and retreats have been conducted by the Redemptorists since February. The priests were few here primarily to do mission work, Father Cloran said, not in foreign lands, but particularly in the various parishes. They were always at the call of the local pastors and at the present time found it a problem to answer all the demands.
