WARMLY GREET FORMER CITIZEN

Boar of Trade Dinner Party Gives John Scott Ovation

Spontaneous Tribute in Native City to Managing Editor of Montreal Gazette

A very pleasing incident of the Board of Trade dinner of last Tuesday evening at the Admiral Beatty Hotel was a spontaneous greeting accorded to John Scott, managing editor of the Montreal Gazette, a Saint John man who, from the position of junior reporter on one of the dailies here a quarter of a century ago, has steadily risen to high place in the journalistic field in Canada. Mr. Scott and his wife came here to enjoy renewal of acquaintances with friends of former days in Saint John.

HAPPY RECEPTION.

J. F. B. Livesey of Toronto, general manager of the Canadian Press, and Mr. Scott were guests at the dinner Tuesday night and were heard in impromptu speeches. It was a singularly happy reception that Mr. Scott received when he arose at the unexpected request of the chair. Being a Saint John boy, a locally-trained newspaper man and having reached one of the topmost places in newspaper executive work in Canada, the business men took occasion to compliment their guest in no uncertain manner. Applause and shouted greetings caught the quiet-mannered visitor somewhat off his guard and he not ungraciously began his remarks with hesitancy.

The newspaper life gripped John Scott early, and as a lad, he must have been a member of the "Telegraph" of the period. He went to the Montreal Gazette on an opening presenting itself there, and his success came soon, for he had the material in him and the opportunity was at hand for development. He rose from one position to another until his managing editor's desk was his one of the greatest of the newspapers of the continent.

Besides his executive duties within the magnificent modern plant, recently opened, he travels considerably between the Montreal and the Canadian and American centres on matters pertaining to news services etc. and a short while ago visited England concerning cable news. It is the privilege of Mr. Scott to see Canada at close range, to live with it in all its essential developments and to mingle with the men who are moulding its destiny.

Therefore when a home-city Board of Trade gathering singled him out for an especially warm greeting Tuesday it was but seizing an opportunity of doing him an honor of which he was quite worthy but which it had never before been possible to express in a public way in his home city. The incident was fraught with considerable sentimental fervor. Mr. Scott expressed his thanks for the reception and remarked upon the enthusiasm and vigor of the business community here, the infusion of new blood into the foremost ranks of citizenship and the general appearance of things generally. He left for home yesterday afternoon, as also did Mr. Livesey.

DORCHESTER ST. BUILDING AFIRE

Blaze in Jackson Building Gives Firemen Battle For Over Hour

Considerable damage was done to the building at 28-30 Dorchester at noon today by a fire which started in the furnace room and required nearly an hour's work by the firemen before it was extinguished. The building is owned by John Jackson and occupied by Harry F. Jackson, ground floor; J. Harry Wilkes, second floor and Richard P. Jackson, third floor. No estimate of the damage could be given this afternoon nor could it be said whether the insurance would be sufficient to cover the loss.

A still alarm was sent in first to No. 3 Engine house but it was soon seen that a stiff fight was before the fire ladders and an alarm was rung in from Box 3. The fire burned its way through the walls and up into the first floor, where considerable cutting had to be done. The damage to the second and third floors was done by smoke.

The first was first seen about 12.15 and it was after 1 o'clock before the all out was sounded.

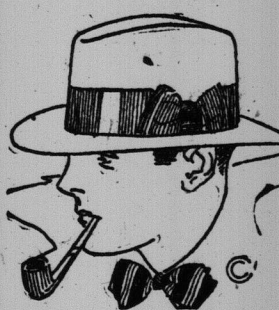
