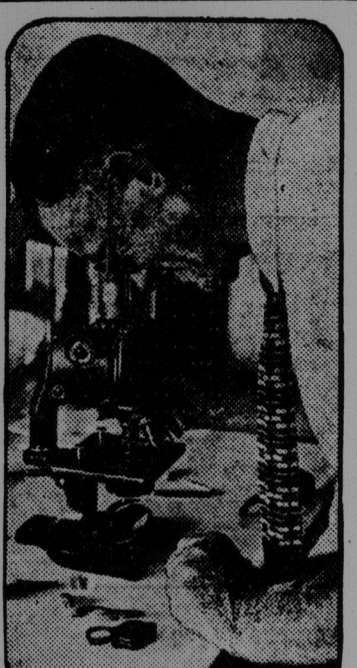

As to the return of Alberta to the natural resources, that is a matter which the Alberta Progressives will argue, but it is thought doubtful if it will be pressed during the next few days.

TENTATIVE CABINET. It is understood that the Department of the Government will be tentatively divided among members of the shadow cabinet as follows: The Hon. Sir Henry Drayton, Acting Minister of Finance and Acting Minister of Railways and Canals; Mr. H. H. Stevens, Acting Minister of Customs and Excise and Acting Minister of Trade and Commerce; Mr. J. M. Manion, Acting Postmaster General and Acting Minister of the Department of Labor, Health and Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment; Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Acting Minister of National Defense and Acting Minister of Justice; Sir George Pailey, Acting Minister of Public Works and W. A. Black, Acting Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

VANCOUVER VIEW. VANCOUVER, B. C., June 29.—Under caption "The Justice Has Happened," the Vancouver Sun says editorially: "Last fall, the two parties of Canada went to the country, but the election was so close to a draw that neither one has been able to put into effect a real national policy. To most Canadians the result has been maddening. Since the election Ottawa has hobbled along on a compromise government. Sooner or later, something had to happen. It is an affront to politicians to say that our nine million Canadians have no brains and ambition enough to want a definite national policy to work up and live up to a policy that will lead to national greatness. Liberals should have nothing to fear in going to the country, because so long as Arthur Meighen heads the Conservatives, that party will be under the auspices of the Young Women's Hebrew Association.

WEARING OF MITRE. An item in The Church Times of London recently asserted that Bishop King was the first Anglican prelate since Caroline times to wear a mitre, when he appeared at a service at St. Andrew's church, Norwich, on June 29, 1888. Rev. F. W. Vroom of King's College faculty and formerly of St. Stephen, points out that at the consecration of the late Most Rev. Charles Hamilton, archbishop of Ottawa, at St. Fredrick on May 12, 1897, the late Rt. Rev. Dr. John Medley, bishop of Fredericton, wore a mitre in Christ Church Cathedral in the latter city. Rev. Dr. Vroom says he is of the impression that Bishop Medley wore a mitre at the consecration of Bishop Kingdon at Fredericton on July 10, 1881.

APPELL DISMISSED. LONDON, June 29.—In the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, the writs of certiorari yesterday dismissed the appeals both of Audet and others against the Lt. Gov. in reference to the cost against Audet and others. The appeals came from the Supreme Court of Canada. The case was a dispute as to the distribution of the assets of the pension fund of the Banque Nationale of Quebec, and was heard by Their Lordships on May 12, 1897 and 18. The costs are allowed from the pension fund.

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GRAND FALLS PLAN APPROVED IN U. S.

Washington Commission Recommends Permission For Development to be Given. Canadian Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—The International Joint Commission has recommended that an order be issued granting to the Saint John River Power Company the right to construct and maintain a power project at Grand Falls in the Saint John river, New Brunswick. The order will go to the two governments from the commission probably today.

LABOR MEMBERS BITTERLY OPPOSE BALDWIN CABINET'S PROPOSAL ON POINT. LONDON, June 28.—The entire session of the House of Commons today was devoted to debate on the Government's eight-hour bill for miners. Sir Arthur Steele-Maitland, who is sponsoring the measure, repudiated on behalf of the Government any desire to attack the miners' hours or wages and he emphasized the serious condition of the coal export industry, which had only been able to fight increasing German competition through subsidy. He insisted that the position would become still worse when the Ruhr was completely evacuated. Stephen Walsh, Laborite and a former miner, in moving rejection of the bill, argued that longer hours meant displacing many thousands of miners and increasing the output, which was already excessive. The discussion was confined to Labor members, all of whom hotly opposed the bill. The debate will be continued tomorrow.

MILL IS BURNED

Lorne O. Chapman, Upper Covedale, Has \$2,000 Loss; No Insurance. MONCTON, June 28.—A serious fire occurred at Upper Covedale on Saturday morning about 11 o'clock when the lath mill of Lorne O. Chapman was destroyed by fire, together with about 6,000 laths. Mr. Chapman on Thursday morning had burned some edgings near the mill and all day Friday at the mill and believed the fire all extinguished. On Saturday morning he saw smoke arising from the mill, which is only a short distance from the house. He hurried to the scene of the fire and found the mill a mass of flames. The neighbors gathered quickly and the flames were prevented from spreading to the woods, which are close at hand. Mr. Chapman lost in the vicinity of \$2,000 and had no insurance.

TRAPPER IS SOUGHT

Mounted Police Hunt For Newfoundland Lost in Northwest Since May 20. PEACE RIVER, Alta., June 29.—In the wilderness, 820 miles northwest of Peace River, a search party, under the direction of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers, is hunting for Herbert Porter, 32, a native of Newfoundland, who has been missing since May 20. Porter, whose people now live in Toronto, Ont., was, it is believed here, a member of a trapping expedition which spent the winter in the North country. On May 20, the missing man separated from his partner on a lonely trail intending to visit a trap line. Failing to return, the partner conducted a search for him, and after it had proved fruitless came to Peace River and notified the police.
