GRAND FALLS APPLICATION IS APPROVED

Waterways Board O.K.'s Project But Maine Must Get 2,000 H. P.

PREMIER VENIOT PLANS MEET ON TENDERS SOON

Says Decision Likely to Mean Another New Industry for Province.

MONTREAL, June 14—New Brunswick may now proceed with the development of hydro power at Grand Falls on the Saint John River, considered the most potential power site in the Maritime Provinces. An order of permission was given by the International Joint Commission here Saturday, conditional on the supplying of 2,000 horsepower for use in Maine and indemnity for property damage caused by the development.

Fifty thousand horse power is the initial development contemplated by the New Brunswick government through the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, involving an expenditure of some millions of dollars. In addition to the 2,000 horse power which will be supplied to Maine, and which has already been contracted for by the International Paper Company at Van Buren, Me., 5,000 horse power will be available for the province of Quebec. This was agreed upon during the last sitting of the Quebec legislature when that body gave permission for the building of dams and other works in this province.

CONCILIATION TRIED.

The International Joint Commission gave its favorable decision Saturday afternoon after a five-hour private session in which it tried to conciliate the opposing claims of New Brunswick and the United States governments, the former refusing to recognize United States sovereign right to the power but willing as a business proposition to sell more power in Maine than the United States asked; the latter upholding sovereign right to a proportion of the power because of the flooding of land in that country because of the development. The Joint Commission, unwilling to set a precedent on what it considered a far-reaching question, avoided a decision on it and left the principle open and undecided.

TEXT OF FINDING.

The commission's finding as given to the press by Sir William Hearst in the presence of the full commission, is as follows:

"The commission has granted an order of approval of plans submitted by the Hydro-Electric Commission of New Brunswick for development of power at Grand Falls subject to a number of terms and conditions with reference to compensation to all parties substantially injured by the development. It has been taken into account in any way in connection with the development.

UNNECESSARY TO DECIDE.

"It has not been found necessary to pass upon the contention of counsel for the United States in reference to the right of that country to a percentage of the power to be developed and the commission has not given any decision in any way on that subject.

"The Hydro Electric Commission has entered into agreement for the sale of 2,000 horse power in the state of Maine at prices which in effect are not to be greater than will be charged to the consumers of power in the province of New Brunswick.

DOOR OPEN FOR APPEAL.

"Should that agreement be terminated or should the commission at any time hereafter cease to supply this 2,000 horse power, an application may be again made to the joint commission to consider the contentions raised at this hearing and to pass upon the rights of the parties in connection with the power claims of the United States.

"The Hydro Electric Power Commission further undertakes that if the International Paper Company fail for any reason to continue this contract for 2,000 horse power that such power should be furnished to such other applicants in the United States until at least further order from this commission is made.

"The formal order when signed by the Commission will contain protection for the rights of all parties affected by the development."

BATHURST, June 14—Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, Premier of the province, today expressed himself at highly elated with the action of the International Joint Waterways Commission in authorizing the province to go ahead with the development of Grand Falls for hydro-electric energy. He predicted a great industrial awakening in the province as a result of cheap power.

Regarding the personnel of the New Brunswick Commission, which is proposed to enlarge, the Premier said tonight that he would be unable to say who the new members of the board would be until after he had consulted his colleagues in a government meeting.

FEELS MIGHTY HAPPY.

"I certainly feel mighty happy over the order of the commission enabling us to go ahead," declared the Premier. Already the International Pulp and Paper Company has contracted to take 14,000 horsepower for New Brunswick, and 2,000 horsepower for Maine, so it looks as though there would be no difficulty in finding a market for the power to be developed at Grand Falls. I think we shall have no trouble in selling the rest of it, added the Premier.

It is proposed first to develop 50,000 then 75,000 and ultimately 150,000 horsepower at the falls. It is understood from information received in a reliable quarter that a firm in Saint John stands ready to take from 8,000 to 10,000 horsepower as soon as the energy is available.

WAITED ON BY CONCERN.

The Premier was waited on here Saturday by representatives of one of the largest lumbering concerns on the North Shore who are seriously thinking of converting their lumber mill into a pulp mill of 30 tons a day capacity. At the time the delegation was here the Premier had not been apprized of the decision of the International Commission so he was unable to guarantee that the power would be forthcoming. The lumber company representatives made it clear that their plan depended entirely upon the development of Grand Falls and the Premier's decision.

DEAD HONORED.

TRURO, N. S., June 14—Peninsula Lodge of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen celebrated Decoration Day of the order in Canada today by placing flowers on the graves of some 28 of the order who are buried in Nova Scotia.
