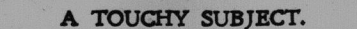

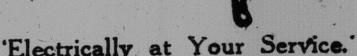

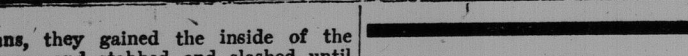

Osman Digna, who inspired this war and warfare, was eventually the victim of treachery among his former followers and was captured in January, 1900. He is now a very old man, said to be almost 100. Should he remain in the country, he would be a great embarrassment to the government. He is usually appointed to commissions when changes are necessary.
