CANADA PERMANENT BUYS
DOW FRASER COMPANY
TRUST DEPARTMENT

Arrangements were completed over the week-end whereby the deposit business of the Dow Fraser Trust Company, approximating a quarter of a million dollars, is taken over by the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation, and the balance of the substantial trust business of that institution is absorbed by the Canada Permanent Trust Company. Hugh M. Fraser and J. H. Forester, for the Dow Fraser Trust Company, and George I. Legate, manager of the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation and its subsidiary, the Canada Permanent Trust Company, have been working on the proposition for some considerable time, with the result that it is anticipated the transfer will be made with the minimum of inconvenience to the patrons of the Dow Fraser Company.

The business being taken over and up to the present handled at the Dow Fraser Trust Company's long established office in Hastings street will be moved to the Canada Permanent Building in Richards street, but the branch at McKay Station, Burnaby, will be retained.

The depositors of the old trust company will be secured by the Canada Permanent's \$39,000,000 of assets, over 90 per cent of which consist of cash and first mortgages on selected, improved and revenue producing farm and city properties, from coast to coast, in Canada. The fact that the corporation collects yearly an amount closely approximating its total deposits of nearly \$7,000,000 is an indication of the unexcelled liquidity of these assets.
