Carpenter Not So Well?

New York Times.—The state of

Georges Carpenter's health, which is

rumored in Paris to be far below what

it was before the war, is causing some

concern to boxing critics in the French

capital, according to a letter received in

the United States from the critic of

Boxe and Boxers, a Parisian sports

journal. This man, who is an intimate

friend of the French idol and has known

him since childhood, declares that Car-

penter has lost one inch in all his meas-

urements since the war, in which the

boxer served as an aviator. The terri-

ble strain involved in the air combat and

the injuries sustained by Carpenter are

said to have been a drain on his vitality,

especially at this time when the French

champion is attempting to bring himself

back to fighting trim. According to this

friend of Carpenter, there has been an

incessant rumor in Paris that Carpenter

will never meet Dempsey.

Marathon Trial.

Hamilton, Ont., July 19.—James A.

Dellow, of the Gladstone Athletic Club,

Toronto, won the Olympic Marathon

trial of nineteen miles and 188 yards

around the Bay here today. Dellow

scored 1:46:46. Scholes, of Gladstone

A. C. Toronto, was second. General

Arthur Scholes' time was 1:59:50 and

the time of Norman General, of Brant-

ford, who finished third, was 2:02:05. Al-

bert Smoke, an Indian, from the Che-

being sent to Antwerp by the sportsmen

of St. Catharines (Ont.), won the ten

mile Ontario championship there on

May 24, led the field of thirty-one run-

ners, for sixteen miles. The record for

the course made by Jimmy Duffy, who

was killed in the battle of St. Julien

1:46:15, still stands.

## OUR ATHLETES AT THE OLYMPIC TRIAL EVENTS

To Sporting Editor of the Times:—

Sir:—The maritime athletes who com-

peted in the Montreal trials are worthy

of great credit for their magnificent

showing, even though they did not cap-

ture any of the first places.

A close observation of the results at

the Olympic trials held at Montreal on

last Saturday will show that although

none of the maritime athletes qualified

for a place on the Olympic team they

fought gamely for this honor. In all

the events in which they failed to get a place

the 100 metres and the 100 yard and

jump. Miller, of Sussex, however, got

third place in the 100 yard and jump. In

the 100 metres Atwood Bridges was elim-

inated in the first heat. "Attie" got

away to a poor start and seems to have

gotten out of the way of starting with

the pistol since his three false starts

made at the final games on June 20. We

looked to Bridges to bring home the

bacon and it was felt that he was one of

the sure bets. All knew of his excellent

time in the trials and felt that if he

had been given a little pistol practice

the result might have been different.

Miller of Sussex and Thompson, the

crack hurdler, had a hard light for the

running high jump. Miller cleared five

feet eight inches, a good four inches to

spare and this jump was so well made

that he received the applause of the

spectators and became a hot favorite at

the next attempt. Thompson only suc-

ceeded and no more at his third attempt.

Miller, however, just tipped the bar and

was eliminated.

The great events, however, were the

800 and 400 metres. Mooney, Stollerton's

crack half guiler, led a fast pace all the

way, but broke to the dash just fifty

yards too soon. He started his dash at

the 200 mark instead of the 100 yards

more. Coster ran a great race in the

400 metres and was beaten by only a

couple of inches, in the most exciting

event of all. "Ted" is a great quarry

runner and it is hard to believe that the

Olympic selection committee do not give

him credit for his ability.

In the 1600 metre race the maritime

favorite, Lapiere, took second place, but

was not badly beaten, as was he in the

Montreal papers. This boy should be

given the greatest credit of all for his

magnificent performance after two

months of train traveling. He arrived in

Montreal at 12:45 p. m. on the day of the

race and he was not able to get a good

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
