NEVER WON A PENNANT.


The Yankees of 1920, rated by many critics as probable pennant winners in their league, will be doing something that no Yankee team of the past has done if they can lead their rivals to the wire this year, says the New York Times. First place is the only spot in the American League championship ladder which a New York American team has not graced at the close of a campaign. In three races New York teams finished second, and once, last fall, the Yankees finished third. Most of the New York entries in the pennant scramble have finished around the bottom of the first division or the top of the second division.

the have finished around the bottom of the first division or the top of the second division.

The campaign now closing is the eighteenth for New York in the American League, and in ten of the seventeen seasons which have passed into history the Yankees have finished either fourth, fifth or sixth. The teams of 1908 and 1912 were tallenders and the 1913 team finished seventh. In 1904 Griffith's allstar combination made the closest bid of any Yankee team for a pennant, but was nosed out by Johnny Collins' Boston team in the final series of the year. In 1910 the team led by George Stallings was a contender for a long time, but finally fell out of the race. It was in the last month of the 1910 race that Stalling was supplanted by Hal Chase as manager. Accidents spoiled the pennant chances in 1916.

Miller Huggins is the ninth manager of the club since New York entered the American League in 1908. Clarke Griffith served as pilot for five complete seasons and part of a sixth, giving way to Kid Elberfeld in July, 1908. The Tabasco Kid remained in charge to the close of that disastrous season, and in 1909 George Stallings assumed charge. He remained until early September of 1910, when Chase was appointed as his successor. Chase managed the team in 1911, Harry Wolverton in 1912, and then came Frank Chance, who ruled during the 1918 season, and resigned one month before the close of the 1914 campaign. Roger Peckinpaugh was manager for the closing month of the season.

It was during the winter of 1914-15 that Frank Farrell, who had been owner of the club since its entry into the league, sold his interests to the present owners, Colonels Jacob Ruppert and T. L. Huston. They engaged Bill Donovan as manager and he remained in charge for three seasons. In 1918 Donovan had his team apparently on the way to a pennant when a series of accidents pulled the team out of the lead and dropped it so far down that it quickly ceased to the first that the first that the first the first that the first that the first that the first that the


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
