LAW AND ORDER

WITH A SHOT GUN

Rev. S. J. Catts, Governor of

State, Threatens to Get

After Newspaper Critic.

Tallahassee, Fla., Dec. 22.—In an open

letter, Rev. Sidney J. Catts, governor of

Florida, threatened to go to West Palm

Beach, Fla., with a "double-barrel shot-

gun, loaded with buckshot" and have a

"final settlement" with Joe L. Earmann,

president of the State Board of Health

and publisher of the Palm Beach Post.

The governor wrote that "he was tired

of Earmann's "tyranny, arrogance and

big-stick boss" and that "this is the

last warning."

"The letter followed publication in

Earmann's paper of an article attacking

the governor in connection with rein-

statement of Edgar Thompson as state

attorney West Palm Beach.

"I am not going to let you rule and

boss me at your will and pleasure," the

governor's letter said. "I am a man and

stand in a man's place and I do not run

away from you in effigy as you did

when they hung you."

"If you publish one more page in

your paper like this last one or in

me or my business or my children any

more, I will go to West Palm Beach,

Fla., with my double-barrel shotgun

loaded with buckshot and have a final

settlement with you."

Gov. Sydney Johnston Catts, Florida's

pastor-executive, is a unique figure in

American politics. He is the man who

assumed the role of a statesman when

years ago when he won a four-year term

as an independent, the first time the

regular Democratic nominee for the of-

fice had failed to win since reconstruc-

tion days.

He used the Bible as his platform and

sermons as his speeches. When this new

form of campaigning had been successful

at the polls, he announced to his people

that he had "choked the devil out of

politics" and that a lot more choking

was in line for the future.

Although a kindly, genial, religious

and industrious man in home life, frow-

ning on frills and ostentation, on the

stump and in the pulpit he has never

hesitated to be aggressive and out-

spoken in his opinions and to call a

spade a spade.

The story of his leaving a pastorate

in Alabama is characteristic of him.

When occupying the pulpit of the Bethel

Baptist church, Fort Deposit, Ala., about

fourteen years ago, after a vigorous re-

mon, he announced that he was ready to

receive donations for the support of

church missions. His requests for \$15

and \$10 a person were almost in vain.

Finally he shook his forefinger at the

congregation and said: "I don't intend

to stand here long and see you sitting

like frogs waiting for it to rain. If I

cannot have the support of my congre-

gation I shall offer my resignation."

Although the worshippers were aston-

ished, that is precisely what Pastor

Catts did.

Before he was a candidate for gover-

nor of Florida, Mr. Catts had several

times tried in vain for public office. He

had run for Congress in the 2d Ala.
