PARASITE TO WAR ON POTATO BUGS

Maine Man Says Insects are Completely Destroying Pests on His Farm.

(Lewiston Journal.) L. L. Haskell of Lewiston has made a discovery that may prove to be of immense benefit to Maine. Mr. Haskell is the owner of Rocky Meany farm, on the north side of Mount Aspetic and like many other farmers is engaged in potato raising. He has been troubled with potato bugs to an unusual extent the present season but claims that a new bug or parasite has made its appearance on his farm and is completely destroying all the potato bugs.

Military Police Get Into Trouble

Montreal Aug. 1.—Three hundred military police, heavily armed, marched into St. Paul and St. Henry factory districts of Montreal this morning and proceeded to round up the available deserters under the military service act. The invasion followed the mauling, yesterday, of a small detachment of military police at the hands of upwards of one hundred frequenters of the district. A diminutive cop was the signal for a civilian for his papers. The latter replied in French, demanding to be escorted in his own language. The cop, a well known non-French and was proceeding to place the civilian under arrest when the latter knocked him to the ground. This was the signal for a general uprising against the military men, and only the timely arrival of the civil police averted a serious encounter. To the military police, heavily reinforced and armed for all eventualities, are systematically combing the district for deserters under the act.

PROSECUTION OF CONDUCTORS ON SLEEPING CARS

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 1.—Considerable interest is being shown in the prosecution by the Canadian Pacific Railway of several sleeping car conductors in their employ on charges of having carried passengers without a regular ticket, and without transferring monies collected from such passengers to that railway. F. V. Williams and A. R. Rawdon, sleeping car conductors, have been committed for trial in Winnipeg police court today on this charge. They both elected for a speedy trial, after pleading not guilty. H. J. Packham is being examined this afternoon on a similar charge. In Vancouver, Montreal and Toronto, it is understood, men are under arrest on this charge. About a dozen arrests have been made in all. It is said that a conspiracy has been unearthed whereby one sleeping car conductor turned over a passenger who had paid no fare to another conductor at the end of his run and that conductors from coast to coast would share in the secret commissions collected in lieu of the regular fares.


The Papers Say
