President Yuan of China has restored their titles and granted pensions to the lineal descendants of Confucius.

The rebel army in Haiti was routed and its leader fled from Cape Haitien yesterday.

A Japanese submarine has been missing for three days and it is feared is lost.

Chinese bandits are said to have massacred 1,800 people at Luan-Chow. A French missionary was killed and two others held for ransom. A Chinese army of twenty-five thousand is about to assault the entrenchments of the small bandit army.

**Death of Rev. J. W. Campbell.**  
New York, Feb. 21.—Rev. J. W. Campbell, a prominent Methodist clergyman aged sixty-one died yesterday at the home of his daughter in Scarborough, N. Y. He had been the pastor of churches in Cleveland and Los Angeles, and had filled the pulpits in three of the most important Methodist churches in New York.
