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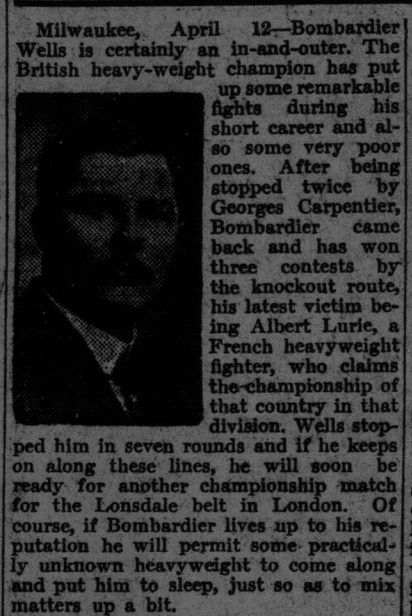
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The Lonsdale Belts

The conditions governing the Lonsdale belts, emblematic of the championship of Great Britain, are not just what they should be at the present time and there are a few mix-ups. All championship contests for the Lonsdale belts must be

held under the auspices of the National Sporting Club of London, and this club, in the past, has dictated the rules and also the weights which govern contests in that country. In an effort to bring about a universal scale of weights and championships, Lord Lonsdale offered eight championship belts, one for each weight, which he put up for competition. It was understood that each belt-holder must defend his title within six months, if called upon. This has proven a rather serious obstacle to some matches and it is now apparent that the rules will have to be changed in order to meet present day conditions.

For instance, Johnny Summers, according to the National Sporting Club of London, is the welterweight champion of Great Britain, although he has recently been beaten twice in Australia by Tom McCormick, another British welterweight of London. McCormick, according to common sense rules, is the champion, but under the Lonsdale stipulation Summers still holds the belt. It is hardly probable that the club will want to match Summers with McCormick in view of the fact that the latter has twice defeated Summers within a short time. That is one reason why the club would like to have the rules changed so that in the event of two British boxers meeting away from home for the title, the victor would be recognized as the champion. There have been other cases similar to this in the various classes.
