It was an exceptionally large blast. The part of the building where the stone went through is about 20 yards from the place where the blast was fired and the piece of rock fell with such force that it broke through a joist in the roof and tore the plaster and laths off a great portion of the ceiling. Fortunately there was no one in the dormitory at the time. Another large piece of stone was found in the garden of the home.
