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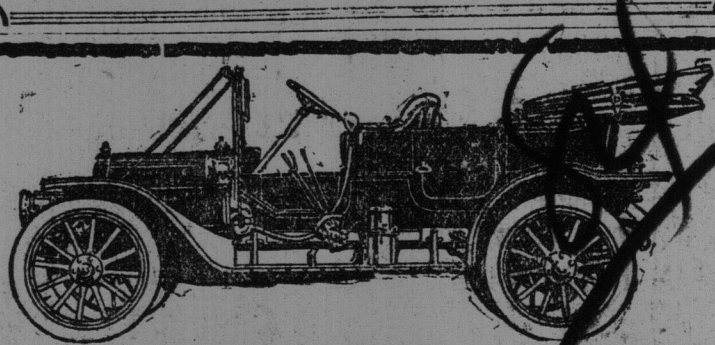

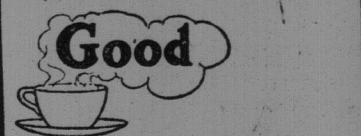

THE COTTON MARKET OUTLOOK

(E. - C. Randolph's Weekly Market Letter furnished by J. M. Robinson & Sons.)
 New York, June 23.—There has been a severe decline in the cotton market, during the last week under general liquidation and more aggressive short selling encouraged by a change of weather conditions in the western belt and at least partial relief from drought in that section of the country. This would seem to have been entirely a new crop influence, but the old crop positions have been sharply lowered in a manner suggesting that the bigger bulls had greatly reduced their lines, and left a trailing loss interest to face the probability of a large crop next season and a large early movement from the southwest.
 At any rate, the near months have sold about 150 points under the high records of the season, while new crop positions have had a break of about 83 a bale. There has been drastic liquidation of the scattering long interest on this decline, old crop positions have been carried far below a parity with southern quotations for middling cotton, and, technically speaking, the position of the market must have been considerably strengthened, while there still appears to be some uncertainty as to whether the rains in the southwest have been sufficient to furnish all needed relief.
 On the other hand, bullish confidence has been shaken, the trade is looking forward to a very favorable July condition report, and one of the incentives for a bullish position on the early autumn deliveries such as was previously furnished by the anticipation of end-season old crop bull campaign—has been practically eliminated, for the time being at any rate, by the apparent abandonment of the old crop positions by the leading bulls.
 The unsettled weather in the southwest set in about the 14th. Our best advice received just previously had indicated that Texas was beginning to need rain rather badly, and that unless rain occurred within a week or ten days the crop might suffer some damage. Since then the weather has been more favorable. Light showers to moderate rains have been reported from a number of points, the weather has been cloudy, and while temperatures continued

ON TO NEW YORK IS
CRY OF WOULD-BE
GREAT SINGERS

More Than 50,000 Last Year
 Labored in Big City to Become
 Caruso or Tetrazzini—Some
 Words of Caution

New York, June 23.—Vocal Young America is getting ready for its pilgrimage to fascinating New York. One hundred thousand would-be Carusos and Tetrazzini are going longingly in the direction of the musical metropolis, ready to pay a vast sum to be taught how to exercise their larynxes.

All the young men and women will not reach the spot of the heart's desire this fall, but many thousands will, and their task is not easy. Air castles will tumble down about the ears of more than one aspirant for operatic or concert honors.

There is no doubt that New York City is the Mecca of music-lovers in this country. According to William Nelson Barratt, one of the country's authorities on voice and singing, it offers broader opportunities for study and the hearing of the best music of all sorts than any other city in the world.

The foremost opera singers living appear regularly during twenty-two weeks each season at the Metropolitan Opera House. In addition hundreds of the leading concert singers of this and other countries frequently face large audiences in song recitals, oratorio and miscellaneous programmes. To hear the finest music interpreted by the representative singers is part of the student's education, and an assistance to the New York singing teacher's bank roll.

Some Advice
 "Last year," declares Mr. Barratt, "more than 50,000 students of voice laborled in New York. Many of them, fortunate in finding the right masters and guided in the right direction, made satisfactory progress; but far too many are turning disappointedly homeward, their minds in a haze because of misinstruction received at the hands of charlatans who flourish wherever population is dense."

"After all, to one possessing a voice, attractive personality, intelligence, industry and the necessary money the important essential is the teacher. There are a sufficient number in New York to instruct most of the young singers justified in seriously entering upon a professional career, but they are not always found by inexperienced students who know less about selecting a singing-master than singing itself."

"If some means might be devised to enable the prospective pupil to test the abilities of a teaching-candidate much time, money and heart-sore could be saved. Unfortunately, one cannot call upon a teacher to demonstrate claimed superiority as in the case of the athlete who invites a boxing-instructor to don the gloves for a brief bout."

"Many a competent teacher, cannot sing, therefore it would be useless to try to form an opinion of his teaching abilities even if the pupil felt most example would furnish the information desired. Contrariwise, some admirable singers with showy voices, a flip manner of playing a piano accompaniment and suave speech but scant knowledge of teaching, often convince an applicant that he is the real divine on earth."

"Nevertheless, there are ways of tracking the legitimate voice-teacher to his lair, and not without careful thought and the exercise of intelligent judgment. The student teaching New York with little more than a good voice, a big ambition and no large sum of money should hesitate, investigate and ponder before deciding upon a teacher, or predict for the future."

"The ones commonly to be avoided are those promising extravagant things. Look for the good ones or those who guarantee to make the quality of the voice to that you secretly desire and to place it permanently within a student's throat. Beware of the person who assures a place in opera. Run from those who belittle the efficiency of their colleagues, or predict for the future."

"Before even considering starting for New York to study the young singer should exhaust every possible means of proving the possession of the qualities previously mentioned. But, having reached the big city with plenty of time to find the teacher who can bring results, for he is to be found."

CITY HEALTH MATTERS

A resolution asking the board of works to see that tenders are made for the removal of garbage in the city will be submitted at the next meeting of that body. The resolution was passed by a majority of the board of health and common council committee yesterday. A favorable report was submitted in connection with the resolution of the Carrington-Manufacturing Co's plant as an incinerator plant.

Mention was made of the unsanitary conditions of the gutters in the Lancaster highway. Dr. Melvin will bring the matter before the next meeting of the council. Thomas Sears was appointed a temporary inspector for the board in Fairville.

A discussion took place relative to the action of the hospital commissioners in closing the epidemic hospital for repairs without notifying the board. While it is being renovated the board will allow the commissioners to have the use of the isolation hospital.

 LOBSTER STEW.
 Scald one pint of milk, add 1 1/2 cup finely-cut lobster meat and cook 15 minutes. Season with salt and pepper, add 2 table-spoons butter, and just before serving 1/2 cup of clam water. If the latter is not available, add the same amount of milk.
