TOM FOLEY TALKS OLD TIME SPORT

Meets Friends on Visit to St. John—The Olympic Bouts.

Tom Foley, who was looking after the Nova Scotia boxers in the Olympic trials, made arrangements this morning to take charge of the three Olympic bouts, who are to go to Toronto for trials June 20 and 21. He held a conference with A. W. Covey last night and agreed to take over this important position, but this morning he received a communication from Halifax and notified Mr. Covey that he would be unable to act. Later he agreed to go to Halifax today to complete some business arrangements and return to St. John next Monday or Tuesday. He will remain with the boys for eight or ten days and will then leave for his home.

Mr. Foley is managing Roy Chisholm and Nedder Healey, and as both are to engage in important bouts in Gloucester, the former on June 18 and the latter on June 26, he felt that he would be doing them at the present time. His present arrangement, however, is expected to work out for the benefit of his professional charges as well as the boys who are endeavoring to make the Canadian Olympic team.

Speaking to a representative of The Times-Star this morning, he said he had thoroughly enjoyed his stay in St. John. He renewed old acquaintances with Dan Britt and other members of the old roses and Alerts, whom he played against years ago while a member of the Standards and Resolutes baseball teams of Halifax. He also met Traffic Policeman Andy Duffy, and talked over the days when he and Bart were winning fame as a speed skater. He also took opportunity of visiting Fred Logan's boat-house, where he inspected a new shell recently constructed by Mr. Logan and Harry Belyea for the former's son, Willie. He pays a tribute to the workmanship displayed in the construction of the shell and the oars.

The Bouts Last Night

Speaking of the bouts in the Arena last night, Mr. Foley said he considers they were exceptionally good and he is confident that the three boys selected to go to Toronto will make an exceptionally good showing and would not be surprised if they would win a place on the Olympic team. He said that Wright who won the 147 pound class event from McLean was greatly disappointed because he had not been selected to go to Toronto. He is a marathon runner and has entered in the five mile race in Montreal on Saturday. He informed Mr. Foley that if he had known the winner of the 147 pound class was from St. John, he would have been very glad to see him.

Mr. Foley said he was greatly pleased with the showing of Wright who scored a

victory over McLean, who knocked him out in the Maritime championships in Halifax a few weeks ago. He felt that if he could have had Wright under his wing for another couple of weeks he would have been qualified to compete in the big trials in Toronto.

The boxers who competed in the preliminary trials here but who were not selected for the Canadian trials, left this afternoon for their homes in Nova Scotia. Jimmy Cruickshank, The Fighting Cop, was also greatly disappointed because he was not chosen to go to Toronto.

William Cavanaugh of Westville, N. S., Louis Donaghy of this city, and "Nixey" Kennedy of Halifax were due to go to Toronto this afternoon to start training for their final test in Toronto.

McLean of Sydney was accompanied here by "Big" Dan McLeod who is a well known and popular boxing coach.

MISSIONARIES MAY BE IN DANGER

IS APPOINTED ACTING MINISTER

Sec. Treasurer Will Fill Mr. Robinson's Place—Other Appointments.

Fredericton, June 6.—At the convention of the Provincial Government's meeting this evening it was announced that Hon. Dr. J. E. Hetherington, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, had been appointed acting Minister of Lands and Mines. He will continue the duties.

Premier Veniot had been acting minister since the resignation of Hon. C. W. Robinson upon his elevation recently to the Senate. The appointment of Hon. Dr. Hetherington as acting minister means there will be no immediate permanent cabinet changes and apparently there will be no by-elections just now.

W. E. Golding, of St. John, manager of the New Brunswick Railway Company, which owns extensive timber lands in this province, was appointed a member of the Forest Advisory Board, succeeding Archibald Fraser, of Fraser Companies Limited, who has resigned.

Chief Engineer.

S. R. Weston, of St. John, was appointed chief engineer of the new Brunswick Electric Power Commission. He has been acting as chief engineer since the retirement of C. O. Ross, some time ago. Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith presented the monthly report of the Hydro Commission to the Senate and asked for a further grant of \$25,000 towards completion and finishing of the new apartment building at the University of New Brunswick.

MORE ROOM AT NORMAL SCHOOL

Premier Says Matter Being Considered—Closing Exercises Today.

(Special to The Times-Star.) Fredericton, June 6.—Intimating that in the near future steps would be taken to relieve the cramped condition of the accommodations at the Provincial Normal School, and speaking strongly in favor of continuation of a minimum salary standard in order to keep school teachers in the province, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier of New Brunswick, was heard in an eloquent address at the closing exercises of the Provincial Normal School here this morning.

Lieutenant Governor W. F. Todd presided and there was a large attendance of the Provincial Government were on the platform.

The principal, Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, outlined the work of the school for the year. He made particular reference to the progress made by the French-Medals Presented.

The Governor General's silver medal for the highest professional standing in Class I was presented by the Lieutenant Governor to Elmer H. Wiley, of St. Stephen.

The Governor-General's bronze medal for the highest professional standing in Class II was presented to Ernest N. Myers of Fredericton presented to Miss Genevieve Frost of Hampton and Charles M. Hare of St. John, who tied for first place, duplicate of the City of Fredericton made during the last few years.

Premier Veniot Speaks.

Commenting on the fact that this was the first time he had had the pleasure of attending the closing exercises at the school, Premier Veniot congratulated the officials on the progress made during the last few years.

He said that he had been informed by the principal that the accommodations were rather cramped and although the Government would do, he could say that the matter of additional classrooms was under consideration and he felt that in the near future more quarters would be provided.

He expressed a keen interest in matters of education and declared that New Brunswick would not allow its educational system to be lowered to the level of the other provinces. He hoped that the public would show increased attention to matters educational.

He referred to the loss of teachers which the province had suffered in the past by movement westward, and spoke strongly in favor of the maintenance of a minimum salary standard.
