KIETH CANN PUT IN

Sheltered at North Head in Storm Encountered on Saint John Trip

YARMOUTH, Dec. 13—The coastal steamer Keith Cann, of Hugh Cann & Sons' fleet, on the Yarmouth-Saint John service, arrived here Saturday morning more than 24 hours late from the latter port. Capt. Peters reported that he left Saint John at 7 o'clock Thursday morning but, after getting out of that harbor, found the gale very heavy and the sea terrific. The little steamer, however, made good weather along the shore and under the lee of Point Lepreau.

It was after that, when Capt. Peters hauled the Keith Cann on to a course for Petit Passage, that the steamer caught the real force of the weather. The gale was a westerly one, while the sea was running terribly heavy from the southwest. So bad was it that Capt. Peters decided to turn the steamer for Grand Manan and about a half hour after leaving Saint John he tied up at North Head.

DOORS SEALED UP

The thermometer hovered around zero and in consequence the steamer became heavily iced which gave her a load list. The weather doors of the houses on the upper deck were sealed so firm that they could not be opened. The Capt. Peters reported that he was unable to get the doors open until Friday afternoon when Capt. Peters proceeded for Yarmouth.

MARINE SCHOOL IN YARMOUTH MOOTED

YARMOUTH, Dec. 13—At a meeting of the Board of Trade last week the matter of again establishing a Marine School was discussed. A resolution was read by Dr. Edwin Crowell on the requirements of such a school here. P. L. Hatfield, M. P.-elect, informed the board that if an examiner could be procured the school would be assured. Dr. Crowell also explained that a navigation school was about to be started in Yarmouth by the Marine and Fisheries Department, in which the doctor would be the teacher. The resolution was adopted by the Board of Trade and the matter will be taken up further by the Marine and Fisheries Department.

Man Is Drowned In Guysboro Lake

ANTIGONISH, Dec. 13—Francis Malloy, 26, was drowned and his two companions had a narrow escape when the boat in which they were crossing Two Mile Lake, Guysboro county, overturned and precipitated all three into the icy water Saturday. Malloy succumbed to the severe cold, but his companions managed to cling to the overturned boat until help reached them.

U.S. PORTS GET BIGGER SHARE CANADA GRAIN

Handled 18,610,104 Bushels of 24,095,814 Shipped to Britain in November

4 MONTHS' RETURNS ALSO SIGNIFICANT

Balance of Harbor Business Heavily Favors States in Longer Period

OTTAWA, Dec. 13—The great bulk of Canadian wheat which was exported to Great Britain during the month of November went by United States ports.

The United Kingdom was Canada's biggest buyer of wheat during November, but of the 24,095,814 bushels which went to Great Britain, 18,610,104 bushels went via the United States and 5,485,710 bushels via Canadian seaports.

The value of the wheat passing through the United States to Great Britain was \$24,974,071. Of that passing through Canadian ports the value was \$7,659,492.

EXPORTS TO U.S. GAIN.

The exports of Canadian wheat to the United States during November totalled 2,082,507 bushels with a valuation of \$2,565,298. This compares favorably with the exports for November 1924 which were 462,915 bushels valued at \$691,382.

During the four months ended November 30, a total of 63,632,820 bushels of Canadian wheat have gone to the United Kingdom via the United States as against 19,442,977 bushels which passed through Canadian ports.

IS CARRIED 12 MILES IN PILOT; MAY DIE

LAKE ELMO, Minn., Dec. 13—His light truck struck by a train at a level crossing, Victor Lohmann, aged 41, was carried 12 miles on the engine pilot before he was discovered. His condition is serious.

Bridge at Border Closed to Vehicles

ST. STEPHEN, Dec. 13—The International bridge between St. Stephen and Calais is closed as far as teams, automobiles and electric cars are concerned, although those on foot may come and go. The Calais end of the bridge is undergoing repairs and it will likely be a couple of weeks before it is opened again. In the meantime teams and automobiles must go around by the way of Union and Milltown.

VICTORIA EX-SHERIFF DIES.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 13—Francis G. Richards, 70, sheriff of Victoria from 1912 until 1923 and a resident of this city for more than 60 years, died Saturday morning.

TWO LECTURES ON SUNDAY EVENING

Father Cloran at St. Peter's; P. J. Hughes in West End Hall

St. Peter's Y. M. A. Hall was thronged last night when Rev. James Cloran, C.S.S.R., gave his introductory address, beginning a series of addresses on character, which he will give on Sunday evenings under the auspices of the Saint John North sub-division of the Catholic Women's League. Mrs. W. J. Harrington, president, was in the chair. Father Cloran held his large audience in rapid attention. Asserting that man was created to attain heaven, Father Cloran said that neither intellectual address, mental nor wealth could satisfy man for the soul of man thirsted and hungered after what it was created for and perfect happiness could not be attained in this life.

Father Cloran announced that Father MacDonald, C.S.S.R., would contribute some lectures to the winter program, and would speak on subjects of Canadian history, with which he is very familiar.

DELIVERS LECTURE

Peter J. Hughes, K.C., of Fredericton, gave an interesting lecture in St. Patrick's Hall, West Side, last evening. His subject was the Jesuit Settlement in South America. The lecture was under the auspices of the Holy Name Society and was largely attended. Solos were sung by Mrs. Charles Morris, accompanied by Miss Josephine Wetmore, and Frederick Joyce, accompanied by Mrs. Morris. The appreciation of the audience was expressed in a vote of thanks to Mr. Hughes, moved by Frank Owens and seconded by Edmond Fitzgerald. Judge J. A. Barry presided.

PROF. McLENNAN VISIONS SUPER-FUEL

Power Will be Thousands of Times That of Any Now Known

TORONTO, Dec. 13—Elimination of the fuel problem of modern life by development of a fuel, the power of which would be many thousands times that of anything at present known to science, was predicted by Prof. McLenan, head of the Department of Physics of the University of Toronto, in a lecture on "Helium and the Atomic Theory," in a statement here.

Working from the fact that it was now possible to manufacture helium from hydrogen and at the same time produce enormous amounts of energy, researches now being carried on, which Prof. McLenan believed, would ultimately enable scientists to produce the super-fuel which would be the panacea for all transportation and fuel problems. He pointed out that it should be theoretically possible to begin with hydrogen and helium, and by the use of the atomic theory, in a statement here.

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64,789 COME TO CANADA WITHIN SEVEN MONTHS

27,939 were From British Isles, 12,703 From U. S.; 21,275 Canadians

OTTAWA, Dec. 13—A total of 64,789 immigrants entered Canada during the seven months of the fiscal year ended October 31 last, according to statistics of the Department of Immigration and Colonization. Of this total 27,939 were British, 12,703 came from the United States and 24,147 from other countries. The British immigration consisted of 14,608 English, 4,556 Irish, 8,044 Scotch and 731 Welsh.

CARDINAL SCORES MEDDLING PERSONS

Cornerstone of Civilization Isn't Puritanism Nor Prohibition

BOSTON, Dec. 13—The cornerstone of Christian civilization is not puritanism, nor prohibition, nor meddling in other people's business or interfering with their privileges, but charity, William Cardinal O'Connell declared in an address here today. He scored the person of puritanism, meddling, restrictive temperance as one whose viewpoint is one-sided and intolerant. Citing the so-called Blue Laws of the present generation as instances where this type had run wild, Cardinal O'Connell said: "You cannot but realize that their sting desire to become perfect, but they took the wrong road. They would eliminate all pleasure. Nearly one of these persons has gone to excess in the matter of wine. Those who seek to impose their will and ideas on the world will not succeed."
