He scored the person of puritanical, meddling, restrictive temperament as one whose viewpoint is one-sided and intolerant. "You cannot but admire their sterling desire to become perfect, but they took the wrong road. They would eliminate all pleasure. Nearly every one of these persons has gone to excess in the matter of wine. Those who seek to impose their will and ideas on the world will not succeed."
