


## BRITISH EMPIRE STEEL CHARTER COMMENTED ON

News of Incorporation of  
Half Billion Concern in  
Nova Scotia Leads to Con-  
siderable Curiosity at Ot-  
tawa.

Ottawa, May 24.—The news that the  
British Empire Steel Corporation was  
incorporated under the joint stock com-  
pany act of Nova Scotia, with a capital  
of half a billion dollars, has led to con-

siderable curiosity being evinced here as  
to why a dominion charter was not  
secured.  
The report from Nova Scotia states  
that the dominion application was with-  
drawn by the corporation. Inquiry fails  
to verify this, but equally fails to get  
information as to whether the applica-  
tion was refused or not. It is believed  
that the government in view of the fact  
that the matter had been made the sub-  
ject of debate in the house of commons  
and was certain to be raised again,  
asked for so many details as to capital-  
ization and assets that some of the com-  
panies in the merger objected.  
The question now arises as to the  
validity of a Nova Scotia incorporation  
for a company doing business all over  
the dominion. If the British Empire  
Steel Corporation is to be regarded sim-  
ply as a holding company with no assets  
except the shares in other companies,  
the other companies holding their assets,  
the provincial incorporation may be just  
as effective, as the company might claim  
it was not in business throughout the  
dominion. If it is to be regarded as  
a company doing business throughout  
the dominion, then there is some doubt  
as to whether a provincial incorporation

is enough for business conducted be-  
yond the borders of the province in  
which incorporation was granted.  
There have been conflicting judgments  
on the point by Canadian courts, and it  
is thought here that the privy council  
would find it a perplexing question to  
decide.

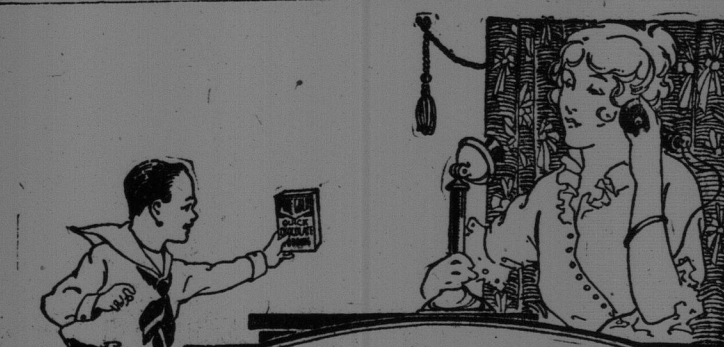
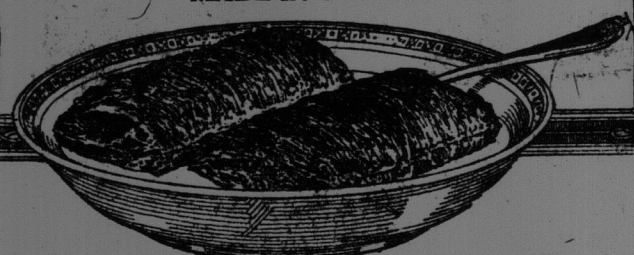

## CONFERENCE ON FREIGHT JAM
