HALIFAX AND THE SHORT LINE

The first Short Line train will be due in St. John at 2:55 local time on Saturday afternoon, and so doubt there will be plenty of our citizens at the station to witness its arrival. Although the Short Line comes, without any ceremony, parade, and in the most matter of fact manner, the opening of this road must be regarded as the most important event in the railway history of St. John, bringing us as it does within eighteen hours of Montreal, which could be easily reached in sixteen or less, and reducing the time to the chief commercial city of Canada by just one half. The Intercolonial railway authorities propose to take advantage of the opening of this road by running a fast express train from here to Halifax making close connection with the Short Line here. This will bring Halifax within about twenty-six hours of Montreal or fifty ten hours better than the best time made over the Intercolonial in summer. for publication at the rate of 40 cents a line, it could not have been more fully embodied in this issue. This Mr. H. who is modest to give the public his name, in order that they may gauge the worth of his opinions, has a very great contempt for the people of St. John. He regards the people of this city as being "a mercenary, ungrateful" and says "I do not take much to work them up to what appears to be a very temperamental condition." That being so, it is idle to say that Mr. Peters was appointed by the St. John Common Council. The Common Council had no part to play in framing the bill. Mr. Peters was legislated into office as police magistrate, with the concurrence of the government, and he was displaced by the government for no cause whatever except the desire to satisfy the hunger of a greedy partisan.

It will be seen to Mr. Stockton to learn that he advocated the appointment of Mr. Peters on the ground that he belonged to one of the old families, but as we remarked before, the grandson of a Loyalist is entitled to much respect as the son of the master of a Ribbon Lodge. If the Roman Catholic question was raised in this controversy, it has been, not by the friends of Mr. Peters, but by the friends of Mr. Ritchie. It is well known that Mr. Ritchie is a Protestant and has not heretofore been regarded as a disqualification for office. But it seems that under the Hain-McLellan regime all this is to be changed and that the words "No Protestant need apply" are to be written over the government offices. It is a pity that such an issue as this should have been forced upon the people of this Province, but the responsibility must rest on the government and we are of the opinion that they will be very weary of this fight before they see the end of it.

Cumberland is a Scott Act county and the law is supposed to be enforced in all its towns. A correspondent says the amount of liquor con-

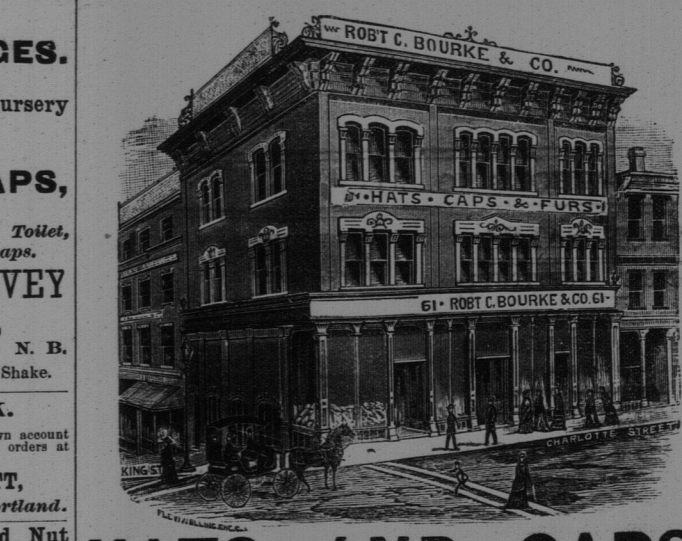
