AFRICAN IVORY.

LARGE SHIPMENTS ARE RECEIVED

AT ANY TIME.

The First Time any Quantity of Ivory

has Reached Europe via the West

Coast.

ASTORIA, October 8.—A large quantity

of ivory from the Upper Congo is now

being received by every steamer from

Banana. This season the first which

any considerable quantity of ivory from

the Upper Congo has reached Europe by

way of the West Coast.

The present movement of ivory down

the Congo is the result of the index on

the upper river of white traders, who, in

spite of Stanley's opinion, that the Upper

Congo would not be worth a penny mill

Thinking that there might be some

different sources in Galt, as to whether

the young man McDonald was known

there. Neither of the three families who

received the packages have any knowl-

edge of the case, and the only circum-

stance which could in any way con-

nect him with the Galt case.

NO NEW FACTS DIVULGED

POST OFFICE INSPECTOR KING'S

EVIDENCE.

Tracing the Packages of Poisoned

Candy Through the Mail.—

The Medical Testimony.

The great interest which attaches to

the sending of poisoned candy through

the mails and to the death of Mrs. Don-

ald Macrae was maintained last evening

by the numbers present at the inquest.

Coroner Berryman had thoughtfully

arranged for the holding of the inquest

in the City Council room, which of these

evening both inside and outside

the hall was crowded with those anxious

to hear the examination. A number of

witnesses were examined, but with little

exception the evidence so far has pre-

viously been made public through the
