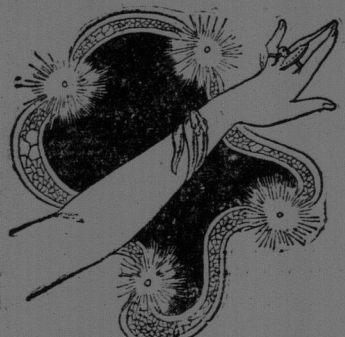

street mansion, without a permit.

In the police court this morning there

drunks with previous records on the
court books. They were fined \$4 each,
and given warning that if they con-
tinued drinking liquor they might be
sent to jail for six months without
fine.

John McMulkin, factory and mill in-
spector for the province, spent Sunday
at the Exchange. Mr. McMulkin is
making a trip along the river in an of-
ficial capacity. He finds many improve-
ments the result of his last visit; while
many were ignorant regarding the law
framed for the purpose of protecting
working men and preventing explo-
sions, etc. "All mill-owners," says the
inspector, "seem quite willing to com-
ply with the law, a copy of which I
have left with each, and I expect to
see the good effect within the next
year."—Dispatch.

On Sunday afternoon considerable
excitement was occasioned just above
Campbellton, N. B., when several men
put out in boats to rescue what they
thought was a man in the river hold-
ing on to Mr. Henry Duncan's fishing
nets. Quite a large number gathered
as there was quite a number in that
vicinity at the time. When the men
reached the net, they were surprised
to find what appeared from the
shore to be a man was nothing
more than a trunk of a tree.

and more convenient one put in its

One hundred and three days out
from Antofagasta, Chili, the Norwe-
gian ship Odersjaa, arrived in port
yesterday afternoon, and will go to
Londonderry in a day or so to load lumber
for Europe. The Odersjaa had a
rather slow passage, she is owned by
the same firm as the Odra which left
port about a week ago for Quebec, and
the Odersjaa, which recently took a
cargo of lumber from here to Europe.
With her black and white checkered
sides, the Odersjaa much resembles the
Odra, and as she came up the harbor
with everything from her royals down
set and drawing, she attracted much
attention along the water front. A
striking example of the extreme dull-
ness in the shipping trade particularly
in sailing charters is shown by the
fact that within the past three or four
months sailing ships have come here
from Rio Janeiro, East London, South
Africa, and Chili in ballast, seeking
charters.—Echo.

OFFERS MADE ALREADY FOR WESTERN LANDS

Veterans Have a Chance of
Selling What They Do
Not Own

Syndicates May be Formed to Handle the
Lands Which It is Probable Will
Shortly be Granted

The discussion which took place a
few days ago in Commons at Ottawa
concerning land grants to South Afri-
can veterans has created a great deal
of interest in St. John and throughout
the Province generally. Already the
bill giving these grants has not yet
passed, many of the men who will be
qualified to receive tracts of 20 acres
each, are not yet in the country, and
there is an apparent desire to secure
options on what is still more or less of
an uncertainty.

The men themselves are not acting
hastily. It is understood that whenever
the bill is finally approved a meeting
will be called of all who are entitled
to and an effort will be made to
secure the allotments as a block, so
that it may be intended to be sold
later, command better terms. Many of
the men will not dispose of what is
coming to them. Several talk of going
to settle, while others will hold on
for a time in view of the possibi-
lity that at a latter date they may de-
cidely move west. Yet in spite of these
plans all is uncertain until the bill is
passed and instructions are received
from the department.

BORN WITH A SILVER SPOON IN HIS MOUTH

Mr. Frank Hartz will be the Wealthiest
Man on Prince Edward Island

In so far as money matters are con-
cerned, Mr. Frank Hartz, of Char-
lottetown, may be said to have been
born with the proverbial silver spoon
in his mouth. He is a grandson of Mr.
Richard Hartz, whose death was an-
nounced yesterday. Mr. Hartz, Jr., is
a son of Mr. Benjamin Hartz, who
died three or four years ago. He is
a very rich man, and his business
ability, and on reaching manhood be-
came associated with his father who
was known as one of the wealthiest
and most successful men on P. E. Is-
land. He prospered, and is believed to
have accumulated a competence before
he was thirty years of age. On the
death of his father, being an only son,
he fell heir to what is for the Island,
a very large estate, consisting of ac-
curties, a valuable farm, and exten-
sive ranching interests in Western
Canada. Mr. Hartz has since con-
ducted with much success the business
previously carried on by his father.
By the death of Mr. Richard Hartz
it is believed he becomes possessed of
a large portion of that gentleman's
fortune. Thus Mr. Frank Hartz
comes into large shares of the estates
of both his father and grandfather,
and he is still a young man. His per-
sonal industry and business acumen
will no doubt guarantee further suc-
cess from his own efforts, and while
he is now looked upon as by far the
wealthiest man on the Island he will
be even richer after the lapse of a
few years.

MAINE ODDFELLOWS

WILL VISIT ST. JOHN

Are Planning Pilgrimage Through Provinces
and Will Stop Here on Way to
Charlottetown

A party of Oddfellows of Presque
Isle, Maine, will be the guests of the
members of that order in the Maritime
Provinces during the latter half of
next month. During part of their tour
of the provinces they will be accom-
panied by Canton La Tour of this city.
Canton Wabasso, No. 22, Patriarchs
Militant, I. O. O. F., is planning the
grand pilgrimage which is to start
from Presque Isle on Saturday, August
15th. It is expected that about forty
members of the Canton will take the
trip.

Sunday will be spent in Fredericton.
In the morning they will be escorted
to church by the local Oddfellows. The
afternoon will be spent driving around
the vicinity of the town and in the
evening a sacred concert will be given
by the military band in their honor.

On Monday the party will sail down
the river to St. John. While in this city

guests of the order.

Leaving Charlottetown on Thursday
morning the visitors will go through to
Halifax where they will spend a day
resting the city, and will leave again
on Friday night to return home.
