

BOY THIEVES LIKELY BE SENT UP FOR TRIAL

In the police court yesterday, Joseph Murphy, Henry Williams and Thomas Moore were each fined \$4 or two months in jail for drunkenness; and John Johnston and Thomas Davis were fined \$8 or two months in jail at hard labor for the same offence.

Bartholomew Grogan and William F. Rogers, the two sixteen-year-old Bostonians who were arrested Tuesday morning and charged with robbing the poor boxes in the Cathedral and St. John the Baptist church on Monday, are being held for trial before the McCormack's restaurant on Prince William street on the same day and robbing the poor boxes in St. Peter's church on Tuesday, before the police magistrate yesterday, when their preliminary examinations were held. The evidence against them was very damning, and they will undoubtedly be sent up for trial when examination is finished. It is possible that they will then elect to become tried under the Speedy Trials Act.

Mr. P. M. Burns, sexton of the Cathedral was the first to give evidence. He stated that he went to the cathedral at 9 o'clock on Monday morning, and everything was all right. About seven o'clock in the evening, he received a telephone message from Bishop Casey, and he went to the Cathedral and found that the poor boxes, his desk, and the safe had been tampered with.

The drawers of the roller top desk were all open and the papers containing the contents of the desk were scattered about. The key of the safe was missing. The safe was open and all the books and papers which were in it were lying on the floor. Forty cents in coppers were stolen, and also a quantity of mutilated and foreign coins. Witness identified some of the coins taken from prisoners, and also the key of the safe.



STARTS SECOND SUIT.

Montreal, June 23.—Rev. Dr. Workman, deposed professor of the Wesleyan Theological College, whose case has for some time occupied a large place in Methodist church circles, on account of his alleged unorthodoxy, has entered a second action for damages against the college authorities. The first action was for \$5,000 damages for libel in the charges made against him.
