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CORNELL TO PLAY HOCKEY THIS WINTER

New York, Nov. 11.—Cornell was admitted last night to membership in the Intercollegiate Hockey League and a schedule of dates was arranged for the six colleges. There will be eight games in this city in the St. Nicholas rink, six in the Boston Arena, a large rink now building in that city, and one will be played at Cambridge in the open air. 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New York, Nov. 11.—From Kansas City comes a prolonged wail of distress from Cyclone Johnny Thompson, who hooked up with Paeky McFarland in a ten round bout there Monday night. Thompson has been trying to get a crack at either McFarland or Nelson for more than a year. He is a tough proposition for anybody and is a ring veteran of much experience. McFarland was forced to meet the Cyclone by the latter's incessant talk, with the result that Thompson says he was robbed by the referee, that he beat McFarland up so badly that a doctor had to be called in and that Paeky was at least eight pounds heavier, or about 145 pounds to Thompson's 134. Reliable reports of the fight say that McFarland was knocked down for the count in the second round and that in the fourth he was bleeding from the nose and mouth, but that in the fifth round he was easily the master, though it was a gruelling mill all the way. There is so much bitter feeling between the men that the result that another fight will be arranged between Thompson has his way. One conclusion to be drawn from this affair is that McFarland is no longer in the light weight class and that he can never hope to meet Nelson unless at catch weights.
