ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT IN CITY'S SYSTEM OF SANITATION

Rev. Hunter Boyd Discussing Underlying Causes Of Tuberculosis Surprised At City's Lack Of Initiative In Providing Public Conveniences, Public Baths, And Better Ventilation Of Buildings Also Much Needed.

At a meeting in the market building last evening, Rev. J. Hunter Boyd in an address to the master painters and kindred industries advocates the providing of public sanitary conveniences

Rev. Mr. Boyd is lecturing under the auspices of the St. John City and County Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis

Condemned Present Conditions. Being asked with reference to the plumbing trade, Mr. Boyd expressed his surprise in city that nearly 50,000 population there was no sanitary conveniences for the use of the general public.

He thought that churches and social organizations would awake to the fact that the lack of such conveniences was a potent factor in sending men to the saloons.
